Young men sometimes fancy they can conceal from others their dissipation. This is an error. Wrong living inevitably leaves some traces that are discernible to the practiced judge of men.

It is probable that never was a time when there was as eager a demand for clean-living and right-thinking men as now, and when there was so keen an insight into all shams.

The young man who wishes to find a place and keep it and to rise, will act wisely if he decides once for all to be genuine, upright, honest, clean in every thought, act and purpose.

He will find that only thus can he win and retain confidence, and that confidence in him on the part of his associates will be the surest and shortest way to success.

Every kind of vice, small and great, will surely at some time hamper and hinder him.

THE POLITICAL POT. All over Canada and the United States the politicians are electioneering. Here we are within three weeks and our neighbors are within four weeks of the voting.

There is another reason. It is in Ontario and the west that the coming contest will be decided. The Maritime Provinces and Quebec are not expected to make very great changes in favor of either of the political parties.

Ontario and the west are much more debatable ground. The change of government in Ontario since the federal election of 1904, the vast influx of new population into the prairie Provinces, the opening of new railways there, and the question of Asiatic immigration in British Columbia, are new factors which must be taken into account.

And yet anything is possible. The effect of which it is impossible to estimate with anything like substantial accuracy.

publicans say this is because the result is not in doubt, that Taft is sure of his election. Democrats on the contrary assert that tens of thousands who have changed their politics from Republican to Democratic have given no sign, but will vote their convictions.

In Canada, too, the election campaign is proceeding somewhat tamely except in spots. There is here and there a county in the Maritime Provinces and in Quebec where the contests are exciting and bitter, but these appear to be somewhat exceptional.

In Ontario and the west the fight is brisker. The cold of the western winters is great and it may be for that reason that they take their politics hot.

A petition for the release of an imprisoned whiskey seller is in circulation, we are told. It is time to have done with such transactions. Let these men keep the law and they will not be sent to jail.

A notable new element has been introduced in our political gatherings, thanks to the Moral Reform League. The plea for honest and pure elections is being earnestly and eloquently pressed.

This is a hopeful symptom of the times. Surely the moral welfare of the people is not of less consequence than mere dollars and cents.

These addresses in behalf of pure elections we hope and trust will have a wholesome effect alike upon the candidates, the election workers and the electors at large.

The movement is a noble one. Let us have a pure election, free from bribe money and whiskey.

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THE TUNNEL.

The Tunnel movement is all the time making some headway. Hon. Mr. Fielding, who holds a most responsible and influential position in the Government of the day has told us he would support it if the work can be done for ten millions, as the Guardian believes it can.

The candidates of both parties in Queens and Prince counties have been outspoken in their advocacy of this great work. This is so far assuring. All the engineers agree as to the work being practicable.

A capable and responsible contractor has offered to construct and complete it for ten millions. It is on all hands admitted that no public work now contemplated would save so much in doing away with existing and costly public services, or would add so greatly to the earnings of the two now separated Government railway systems.

This growth in public favor has been particularly marked during the past year. Leading newspapers of St. John, Toronto, Ottawa and Montreal have assumed a friendly attitude and have discussed the project sympathetically, and as a necessary and promising public work which must some day be constructed.

In a recent visit to New Brunswick the writer of this article was agreeably surprised to find the Tunnel everywhere so much and so favorably spoken of. In Moncton, Sussex and St. John, the common remark was that the Tunnel must be built.

One hears frequently the remark that the Laurier Government will be sustained by a decreased majority. And yet anything is possible. The majority might be increased, or it might be swept away.

While there is less excitement than in many previous Dominion elections there is nevertheless much popular interest. This is shown by the large attendance at the greater political gatherings on both sides.

IN THESE GATHERINGS great or small the active party men among the electors have cheered and applauded their leaders heartily, while the members present who have listened silently but attentively have never been so large.

IN OUR OWN PROVINCE the plan of joint meetings by the opposing candidates has been adopted, and we think wisely. It affords the opportunity of close comparison between the men who are soliciting support; it tends to make the speakers moderate and careful in their statements, and gives the chance for prompt correction or explanation on the spot.

THE GUARDIAN is not making predictions as to the general result. All election predictions are mere guesses. No one ventured to predict a clean sweep of the eighteen seats in Nova Scotia at the election of 1904, but it occurred. The Opposition leaders in New Brunswick did not hope to win carried two thirds of the new House.

THE PLAN OF JOINT MEETINGS is not generally followed elsewhere in Canada. This is partly because the entire evening is wanted by the speakers of one party to review the political issues, to answer charges or to make explanations.

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Liberals did not expect their party to win in 1896, or, to increase its majority down to 1904, but these things occurred.

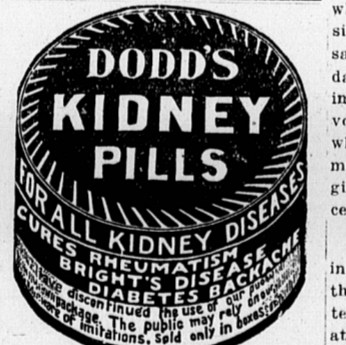
