Champion Diegel Issues Challenge

TORONTO, Aug. 4.—Leo Diegel, who last week won the Canadian open golf championship, has challenged Jim Barnes and Willie MacFarlane, open title holders of the British Isles, and the United States, respectively, to a match for the championship of the world. He issued his challenge prior to his departure for Buffalo.

Diegel feels the challenge should come officially from the Royal Canadian Golf Association, and that one of the matches should be played upon a Canadian course this summer. The possibility of a golfing championship of the world was discussed in an informal manner before Diegel took off in his attempt to establish a world's record for an open tournament.

"This championship is an important affair," said Diegel. "It has attracted many of the best golfers of the United States. I won the Florida open from the 'cream' of the world. I have won other important titles. I think I am entitled to a match for the world's title."

Willie MacFarlane stands ready to play Diegel. It now remains for Jim Barnes to include Diegel in the arrangement between himself and MacFarlane, who have decided to play a world's championship match after the western open, which is held in Youngstown from Aug. 18 to 20.

DOVER, England, Aug. 4.—Mile Stion, the French girl swimmer, failed tonight in her effort to swim the English channel. She was within a mile and a quarter of Dover when she gave up.
