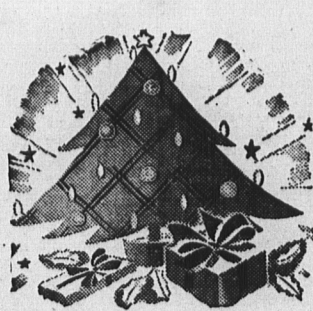

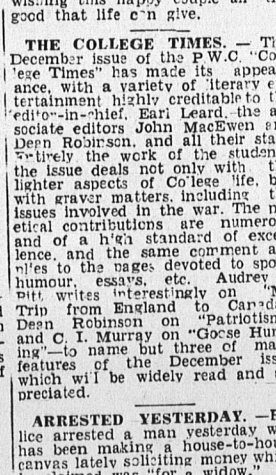
Building Activity Increases

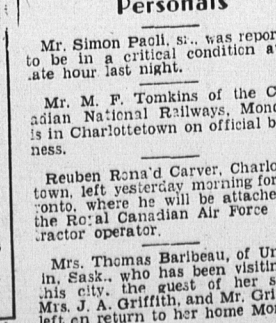

6,000 Casualties

Everywhere in Canada, from Cape Breton to Vancouver Island, from Windsor to Akavik, a great battle is raging without cessation. It is a battle in which 6,000 Canadians died last year. Italy's warfleet has long been credited with superior speed and it continues to use it to race away from every blooming on ouster with the British Mediterranean squadrons. But for the second time in 16 days Vice-Admiral Sir James Somerville (RIGHT), Mediterranean commander, showed the Italians that his strength included "ships" faster than the enemy—the planes of the fleet air arm. As they did at Taranto, the planes roared away from an aircraft carrier that at LEFT, near Sardinia, to torpedo a battleship of the 35,000-ton Littorio class, and help men-of-war severely damage three cruisers and two destroyers.
