Royal Bank Appointments

Sydney G. Dobson named Executive Vice-President; Burnham L. Mitchell appointed Director and Vice-President; James Muir new General Manager.

The appointment of Sydney G. Dobson as Executive Vice President of the Royal Bank of Canada was announced by the Board of Directors to-day. The board also announced the appointment of Burnham L. Mitchell as a Director and Vice President and James Muir as General Manager.

Mr. Dobson, who has been General Manager of the Royal Bank since 1934, first entered the banking business in his native town of Sydney, N. S., as a junior in the local branch in 1908. He has since gained a comprehensive knowledge of Canadian banking and finance through service from Halifax to Vancouver. In 1910 he assumed his first branch management at Sydney, N. S. Later he became Assistant Manager of Montreal Branch, Manager at Vancouver and Acting Supervisor at Winnipeg. In 1919 he was promoted to General Inspector at Montreal. Mr. Dobson's appointment as Assistant General Manager followed in 1922 and in 1934 he was made General Manager. He became a Director of the bank in 1939 and Vice President in 1944. He is a native of New Brunswick. He is a member of the Canadian Bankers' Association in 1937-38. Burnham L. Mitchell, since 1938 Assistant General Manager of the bank at Toronto, becomes a Director and Vice President, following a long and extensive career with the bank in many parts of Canada and Newfoundland. Russia Renews Development of Arctic Empire

MOSCOW, Dec. 4.—(A.P.)—Peace has brought renewed development for the vast sub-arctic empire which Russia began to build on the northern coast of Siberia before the war.

Large settlements of pioneers have long been established in the vast area for the handling of timber, furs, coal oil and rare minerals. A constant procession of ships steamed during the warmer months from Archangel to Vladivostok and back.

The war slowed the program. Although supply ships still made the Arctic run and planes took out necessary supplies, all expeditionary expeditions were turned directly toward winning the war.

Mass Ice Pack

With the fighting ended, almost every day brings a report of some ship voyaging or airplane flight carrying out polar exploration on a scale new to history.

Just the other day Pilot M. A. Truov made the first map of the ice pack which will be of great benefit to spring navigation across the top of Siberia. The famed ice-cruiser Lenin, reached White Island in the Kara Sea to establish a new geophysical station. On another island the first automatic radio meteorological station has been established. Still another automatic station will be installed on a drifting floe.

The Soviets have opened a 4,000-mile Arctic flying route from Moscow through Archangel, Isarka, Tikal Bay, Cape Schmidt to Providenia Bay around the tip of Siberia opposite Alaska. The planes carry passengers and freight and the round trip takes six or seven days.

Weather observations and ice mapping make possible prediction of the proper time for ships to enter the various passages along the Siberian coast; notably between the New Siberian Islands and the mainland, with others to the southward of Sverdrup, Zemlya and Novaya Zemlya. The Arctic is paying off through-
