PARCELS FOR SOLDIERS
 Fruit and Vegetables for Troops Overseas Not to be Accepted Unless Properly Packed

Honourable William P. Mulock, K.C., M.P., Postmaster General has received reports from the Canadian Postal Corps overseas that parcels containing oranges, grapes and apples have been arriving with the fruit decayed. Other packages contained broken jars of jam, etc. — not only the contents of the parcel containing the jam but other mail is damaged by this sticky substance. Lack of care in preparing such parcels causes anxiety and disappointment when they fail to arrive or to reach their destination in good condition.

The Canadian Postal Corps salvaged and forwarded to the addressees such of the contents that were not totally ruined.

Though Parcel Post is not the proper medium for the shipment of fruit or vegetables overseas, those who use this service should never include such commodities in a parcel with other articles. The only likely way to mail fruit or vegetables successfully is to wrap each item separately in paper and pack the shipment in a strong tin box. If each article is dipped in wax before wrapping in paper, it has a better chance to reach its destination. The tin box should be wrapped in thick paper, with an additional wrapping of linen, calico or canvas, well sewn on.

Persons mailing jams, etc. should avoid using glass bottles which will break and cause damage to the other mail and may injure the personnel handling the mail. Such substances should be put up like butter for mailing in sealed tins enclosed in strong cardboard containers, and it is recommended that absorbent material be used to wrap the tin. Parcels should be wrapped in several layers of thick paper and securely tied with strong twine. A slip containing the address and also the sender's return address, should be inserted with the contents as a safeguard.

Customs Declarations should accompany each parcel, which should be correctly addressed and prepaid, and bear the return address of the sender.

New Yorker Takes Gold Fishing Button

JASPER, Alta., Nov. 12 — With entries recorded from all parts of United States and Canada, and also from many parts of Europe, the final awards have been made in the 1940 competition under the auspices of the Maligne River Anglers Club, according to Robert Scamerville, Manager of Jasper Park Lodge, who has issued the award list.

The gold button, emblematic of the grand championship for the year, was awarded to Mr. N. Straus, of New York City, with the silver, or runner-up button, going to Mr. Worthington, Becht, Wis. In addition to the above a large number of bronze buttons were awarded to anglers who qualified as members during the summer. The winning fish weighed 2 pounds 3 ounces and was caught with a Montreal wet fly on a 4 1-2 ounce rod.

The qualifications are very strict in this club and speckled trout must be caught in the Maligne River on a fly rod, weighing less than 6 ounces, with either dry or wet fly. The river extends from Maligne to Medicine Lakes, but the lake waters are not included.

"The Maligne River Anglers Club enjoyed an exceptionally good season," declared Mr. Scamerville. "The fishing was much improved and some excellent speckled trout were obtained. This mountain stream is attracting world wide attention as a fly fishing area and this year we had some very noted anglers."

JUDGMENTS APPEAL CASES — In the Supreme Court yesterday judgment was filed by Chief Justice Saunders and Mr. Justice Saunders, dismissing an appeal in the case of the Irving Oil Company, Ltd. against Mr. J. E. Brown. The action was to recover damages against the appellant over a motor vehicle accident which occurred July 26, 1938, and was heard before Mr. Justice Arsenault and a jury when a verdict was rendered and judgment entered in favor of the respondent for \$1,000. SCALE IN MILES 0 50 100

The Italian army has driven down the west coast of Greece to the vicinity of Parga. Its advance during the last two days, when an important effort was being made, has not been spectacular. Its claims to progress in the middle and eastern sectors appear to exaggerate the truth but the military situation is gradually turning in its favor. Battle conditions between Koritza and Florina are obscure. The Greeks claim that they still are keeping the It-Il-Il base at Koritza under constant shell fire. The Greek forces may be compelled to their belt in the northeastern sector and hereafter be compelled to act more strictly on the defensive. They have done remarkably well so far.

The British have heavily bombed the Italian naval base at Brindisi. The Albanian base of Valona also was raided by Greek or British planes. The Italians claim that they shot down four heavy rains are impending military operations on both sides.
