STOCK QUOTATIONS

Stock Markets At A Glance

WINNIPEG, May 31—(CP)—Export business day on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange included sale of 500,000 bushels of No. 1 northern wheat to the United Kingdom and 100,000 bushels of oats from the Lakehead to United States.

CHICAGO, May 31—(AP)—Wheat and rye futures closed strong on the Chicago board of trade today. Shorts and commission houses favored the small offerings of wheat, and prices were up about two cents from the early low points despite optimistic reports of crop conditions.

NEW YORK, May 31—(AP)—Accelerated buying in rail and industrial leaders today lifted the stock market's average price level to a new five-year peak and boosted many of the favored issues to fractions to around 2 points.

MONTREAL, May 31—(CP)—In continuation of the current trend, papers were again active and higher today in trading on the stock exchange and C.M.R. Market. Oil stocks and industrials were also strong on average and sold down. Changes were fractional except in isolated spots.

LONDON, May 31—(CP)—The undertone was firm on the Stock Exchange today and trading was active. Industrial advances, while home rails received continuous important support and oil and international were firm. British long dated funds were inclined to be easier.

TORONTO, May 31—(CP)—Stocks closed the month on a display of strength in the Base Metals issues and weakness in the gold. Western Oils had an insignificant loss for the day. The Base Metals Stocks registered the widest change, posting an index gain of .88. Pepsin Oreille featured the action as it climbed 20 cents to close at 1.00. Chromium firmed 11 cents to 1.51. Falconbridge added 5 cents, Nickel and Hudson Bay gained 3/4% and Smelters closed a point up. Profit-taking in Ventures back 35 cents to 9.35 and Noranda weakened 1/4%.

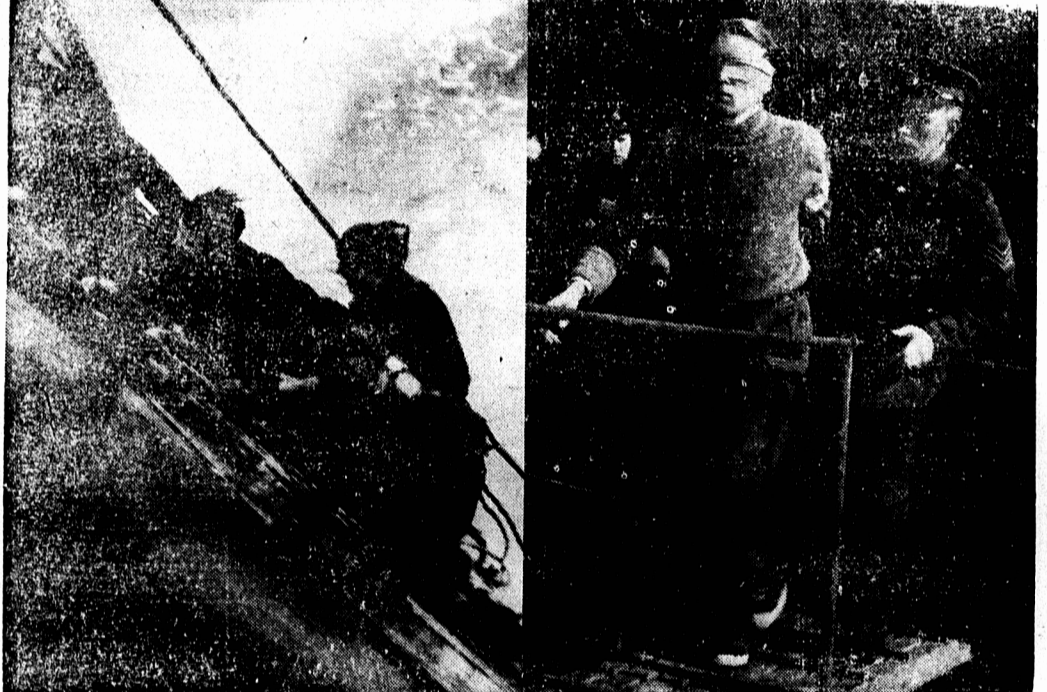

German Prisoners Taken Aft: Recent Sub-Sinking

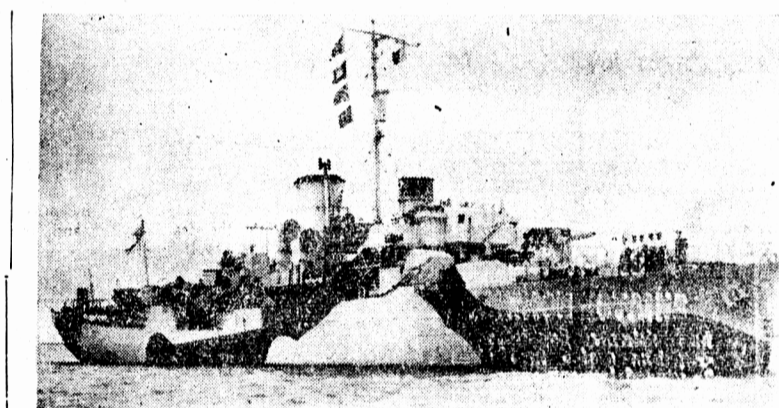

Commanding Officer Who Featured Dramatic U-Boat Sinking



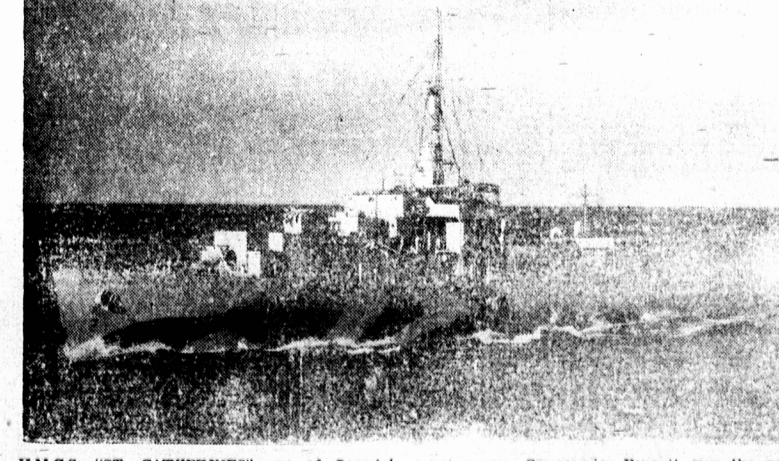
