He further commented that this was an annual occurrence until someone with the interests of our wildlife at heart made the rounds and took what snares could be found up, they would be left set all year to take numbers of rabbits, grouse and pheasants in the breeding season.

Another Nova Scotia sportsman reported an incident where two valuable hunting dogs (Beagles) were lost to the owner and were later found strangled in snares. The season was closed at the time and the owner had the Beagles out for some exercise when they wandered some distance and failed to return. They were found too late. The same hunter while looking for his dogs found a beautiful Ruffed Grouse dead in a rabbit snare that had been taken up when the season closed.

Racing in Maine this coming season will start earlier than ever, according to an announcement of the Pine Tree State Commission. The Orlando, Florida, railbirds were quite excited last week when veteran trainer Ben White stepped the two-year-old trotter Judge Moore a mile in 2:28 1/2 with the last quarter in 34 1/2 seconds. It is believed to be the fastest mile ever trotted over a half-mile track in February by a two-year-old. The Judge is owned by William M. Reynolds, Colgate 2:10 and W. G. Stevens', New Glasgow, Colleen Scott 2:06 1/2.

They are stepping along quite lively down in Florida over the Orlando half-mile track in preparation for a move to Santa Anita where another big program will be raced the latter part of March and until mid-April. One of the most interesting pieces of news that comes from there is that Titan Hanover 3, 1:56, that lost his form so badly last year as a four-year-old seems back on his stride and stepped the last eighth of a 2:14 1/2 mile in 14 1/2 seconds.

Charles Willis, proprietor of Covehead race track, is already featuring his two afternoons, September 17-18 race meet, by offering a \$1,000.00 stake for 2:24 class horses, particulars of which appeared in the advertisement and entry forms which he is sending out, with Goodwill Meet the 16th and 17th at Charlottetown and Covehead with its two afternoons meet following there should be a reputation of the big entry lists of horses and wonderful racing that resulted last fall.

\$36,000 Melon For Four Top N.H.L. Teams

NEW YORK, March 5—(CP)—A new \$36,000 melon of "incentive" pay to players on the top four teams in the National Hockey League's regular season was announced today by President Clarence S. Campbell after an all-day meeting here of the board of governors. The \$36,000 is a brand-new feature in the N.H.L. and is quite separate from the players' pool in the Stanley Cup playoffs.

The governors also announced that winners of all-star berths and of the four league awards—the Hart, Vezina, Calder and Lady Byng Trophies—will be given \$1,000 apiece.

Charlottetown Team Stages Comeback In Latter Part Of Game

Down five goals to two midway in the second period, the Charlottetown Legionaires roared back at Summerside last night to tie the count 5-5 in the opening game of the Prince Edward Island intermediate hockey home and home playoff series. Levine Wins Decision Over Kronowitz

NEW YORK, March 7—(AP)—Rugged Artie Levine, whose claim to fame is that he had welterweight champion Ray Robinson on the floor last November, slugged out a 10-round decision victory over another up-and-coming Brooklyn welterweight, Herbie Kronowitz, in Madison Square Garden tonight. Levine weighed 164; Kronowitz 157 3/4.

Levine got away slowly as Kronowitz scored heavily in the early rounds with his counterpunching, but once Artie found the range he roared up the stretch to win.

At the finish, he had both of Kronowitz's eyes cut and a red stream dripping from his nose and mouth. About the only blow Kronowitz could take is that he maintained his record of never having been floored and that the neighborhood rooters who followed him over the East River from Coney Island didn't like the decision, loud—in fact so loud, the next fight couldn't be introduced over the loudspeaker.

The Associated Press scorecard called it six rounds for Levine, two for Kronowitz—the first two—and two even. The three officials, each voted 6 rounds for Levine, three for Kronowitz and one even.
