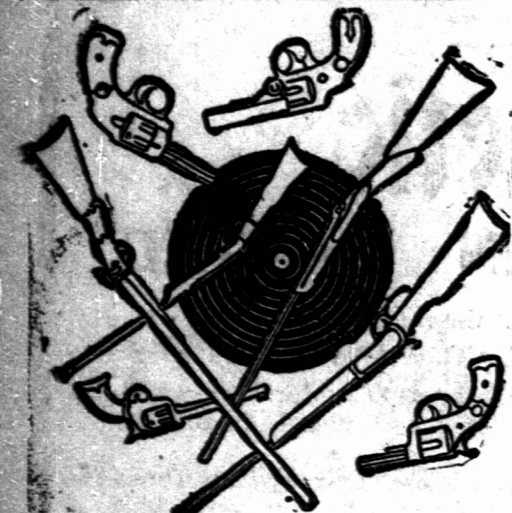

**SOME GREAT NEW BATTLESHIPS.**

The Scientific American tells that the new American battleships Connecticut and Louisiana, with the great English battleships Edward VII, Commonwealth and Dominion are the most powerful and effective fighting craft ever put afloat. The two last named, it is needless to observe, were so called in honor of Australia and Canada. No other nations have a single war vessel which can compare in size, battery and protective qualities with the five battleships named above. The two American warships have a somewhat more formidable armament, while the British vessels have the advantage of somewhat greater speed.

The American battleships each cost \$4,212,000 for hull and machinery and over \$2,000,000 more for guns, armor and equipment. They are of 18,000 tons displacement when fully laden; have a bunker capacity for 2,200 tons coal; a speed of 18 knots; 16,500 horse power; and can steam 7,000 knots at a 11 knot speed, or 2,500 knots at full speed without recoaling. These battleships carry no torpedoes. Their full complement of officers and men will be 801. The American ships referred to each carry four 12-inch, eight 8-inch, twelve 7-inch and twenty 3-inch guns.

The new British battleships each carry four 12-inch, four 9.2-inch, ten 6-inch and twelve 3-inch guns. The armor protection is much the same in the ships of both nationalities.

Organized labor is likely to take a part in the next provincial election in New Brunswick, which is now near at hand. It is thought that labor candidates in St. John may take the field in opposition to the Tweedie Government.

Recently issued statistics show that the world's commerce in 1901 amounted to a little over 23 billions of dollars. Of this seven billions, not far from one third of the total, belonged to Great Britain and her Colonies. So much for British decadence.

Premier Bond's mission to Washington with alleged power to re-establish the Bond-Blaine reciprocity treaty would seem to be a pretty strong bluff to Canada. Should Premier Bond's mission prove successful it would probably postpone indefinitely the union of Newfoundland with Canada. It was the objection on the part of the Dominion government which prevented the British Government from allowing the Bond-Blaine convention to go into operation years ago.

Since the removal of D. K. Dobie to Halifax, Wm. McMillan of Montague has temporarily had charge of the local news department of The Guardian and has done excellent work. He leaves to continue his studies at Prince of Wales' College. D. S. McRae, late of The Examiner, has been appointed to the vacant position, and entered upon his duties yesterday. Mr. McRae is one of the bright young men of Island journalism and may be expected to keep The Guardian's local columns quite up to the mark in every way.

Ottawa has a superabundance of sand which blows about in the wind. In fact, in the region known as Sandy Hill a cemetery was at one time so blown away that tombstones tumbled down and the coffins of the buried people were exposed. The Capital is now interested in a process by which this sand can be converted into bricks of most durable quality without the use of fire. The sand is simply mixed with a secret composition and moulded into the required form. When the new process gets to working well we may make building material out of our Island sand dunes.

Montreal Star says that a personal friend of Sir Wilfred Laurier has just received a letter from the Premier in which he says that his health has not been very good for some time. He has been very much overworked with the work of the Colonial Conference, but he adds that the greatest trouble with him has been his dissipation, such as dinners and receptions. These have worn him out, but he hopes that his trip through Switzerland will do him a world of good. The prospect of the trip already caused him to feel much better.

The death is announced of ex-Governor Ryal of the Northwest. He began life as a newspaper man, and was appointed to the House of Commons service. After some years there he resigned and went to Manitoba where he entered political life and sat for a time in the Commons. He was appointed Governor of the Northwest by the Conservative Government. The deceased gentleman was sixty-five years old at the time of his death.

"A dry Sunday" is reported in Halifax as the result of a more vigorous effort of the police to enforce the law against Sunday selling. The dealers were not given any warning and as a result many fines must be paid. The Chief of Police issued this order to his men: "There must be no liquor sold in Halifax on Sunday. If there is I will hold you responsible." When will the Government of this Province issue a similar order to their prosecutors, not only with regard to Sunday but every day? The laws against liquor selling can be enforced if those in authority desire it, and not otherwise.

President Roosevelt is making a tour of New England which will occupy several weeks, during which time he will give a series of addresses at public fairs and receptions. The political object of the tour is apparent from the fact of a number of newspaper reporters and photographers being taken along, who will give wide publicity to the saying and doings of the President. It is understood that Mr. Roosevelt will be a candidate for the Presidency at the next election, and as that event will not take place till November, 1904 it will be seen that he is taking time by the forelock. The tour will help to keep his name and aspirations before the people as well as help to extend his personal acquaintance with them.

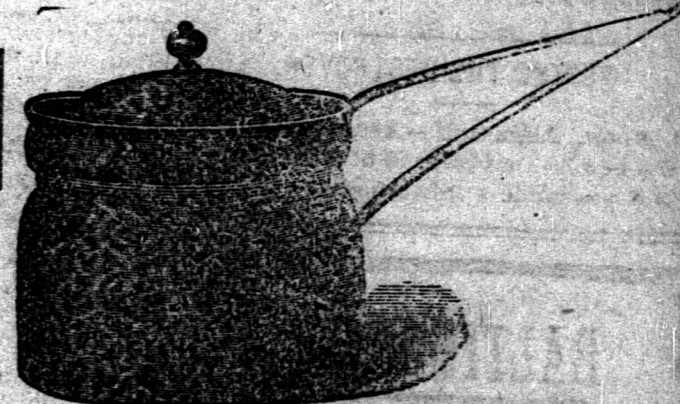
