

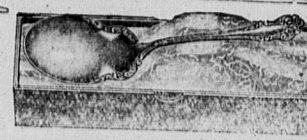

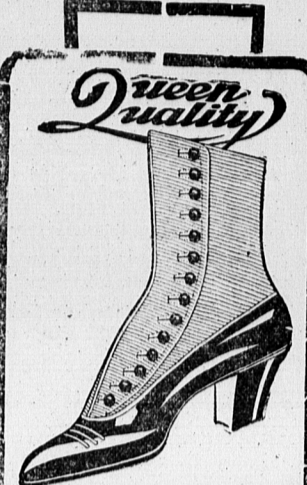

The retail market prices were:—butter fresh twenty-one to twenty-three per lb; butter salt twenty to twenty-three; eggs per doz. eighteen to twenty-one.
