**England's Cricket Mad As Popular Sport Starts**

LONDON, May 25.—England is cricket mad this summer. A team representing Australia is here to defend the mythical "ashes," or win the rubber of five Test Matches to be played between the "Aussies" and England. Interest taken in these games can only be compared to that which grips America during the progress of the baseball World Series.

The term "ashes" was the invention of a newspaper in 1882 after England had lost a memorable game against the Australians by seven runs. Arising out of that defeat the newspaper published an "In Memoriam" as follows: "In affectionate remembrance of English cricket which died at the Oval on August 29, 1882. Deeply lamented by a large circle of Sorrowing friends and acquaintances. R. I. P. N.B.—The body will be cremated, and the Ashes taken to Australia." The games will last for three days, from 11 a.m. until 6:30 p.m., with forty-five minutes interval for lunch and fifteen minutes for tea.
