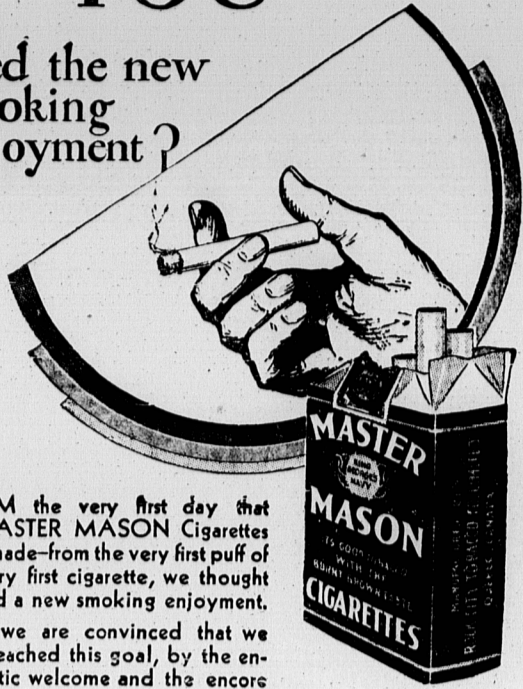

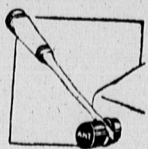

—SUDDEN DEATH—Citizens of Summerside were grieved to learn of the sudden death on Wednesday morning of Mr. John A. Gallant, after only a few hours illness. Mr. Gallant was one of Summerside's most highly respected citizens. He was 67 years of age and a native of Mont Carmel, but came to Summerside as a young man. His calling was that of fisherman and he was well known for his integrity and kindly disposition. He was an honored member of the C. M. B. A. and had a wide circle of friends. There are left to mourn his widow, formerly Miss Mary Anna Arseneault, of St. Nicholas, and three sons and three daughters, namely, Mrs. Walter E. Groeppner, of Manchester, N.H.; Miss Ilene Gallant, R.N., of Wooleboro, N. H.; Miss Florence, at present at home; Frank, Harold and Albert, all of Summerside; also two brothers and two sisters, Joshua of Summerside, and Joe, of Boston; Mrs. T. Gallant of Mont Carmel, and Mrs. M. Arseneault, of Summerside, to all of whom much sympathy is expressed.—S.

—DEATH OF AGED RESIDENT—Friends in the east of the Province as well as in Summerside will regret to hear of the death on Tuesday, September 16th, of Mr. John Curran, of Summerside. The late John Curran was a familiar figure at the eastern end of the town until quite recently and lived to a ripe old age, being in the nineties at the time of his death. He was very highly esteemed by all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. For many years he was tenderly cared for by his daughter, Miss Annie, who nursed him through his last illness. He was born in Mill Cove, the son of the late Lawrence and Anna Curran. He moved with his parents when quite young to New Perth, where he farmed very successfully until he retired eleven years ago and took up his residence at the east end of Summerside. He married Mary Hughes, of Avondale, who predeceased him seven years ago. There are left to mourn two daughters, Mrs. H. F. Moses, of Nashfield, Tennessee, and Miss Annie at home; and four sons, Lawrence J., of Summerside; William S., of St. Peters, P.E.I.; Albert B., of Vancouver, B.C.; and John F., on the old homestead at New Perth; also one brother William M. Curran, of New York City, to all of whom the sympathy of the community is extended. The funeral took place on Thursday morning at nine o'clock from the home to St. Paul's Church and Cemetery and was very largely attended. Rev. J. J. McDonald officiated at the Church and Rev. Benj. —MIRACULOUSLY ESCAPES—An unusual accident occurred at the corner of Fitzroy and Eustace Streets, Summerside, about 10.40 p. m., on Wednesday night, when a small runabout in backing up to make the turn crashed into the telephone post, breaking off the cross bar, which went right through the hood of the car, about four feet of the cross arm going through the seat. The driver, who had cranked up the car, had not time to get in before it backed into the post. He was just able to reach the car and pull the young lady occupant of the car over to the driver's seat before the cross arm crashed through the hood, otherwise she might have been killed. The wires became entangled with the car, which was forced to remain where it was until a wreck-crew arrived from the Electric Light Plant. The telephones in the near-by houses were put out of commission. It was found necessary to turn off the power on the downtown section street lights, until the wires were cut to free the car from the entanglement. It was fully an hour before order was restored. Apart from the damage to the hood and seat the auto was otherwise not damaged.—S.

## Copper Rods

Copper rods when imported by manufacturers for use in their own

factories in the manufacture of electric conductors, the individual units of such electrical conductors not to exceed the area of No. 7 gauge conductor—Free, free, free.

From and after the date of the publication in the Canada Gazette or any such order-in-council, said tariff item 779 shall cease to be of

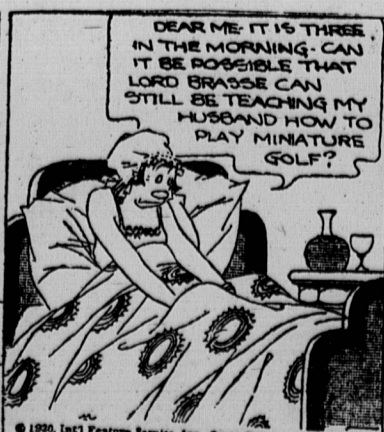
force or effect and the provisions of said tariff item 779A shall cease to have force or effect and item 7 shall become operative and have the force of law.
