IN MEMORIAM

DANIEL FRASER. A cloud of gloom came over the home of the late Daniel Fraser when he passed to the Great Beyond on Friday evening, November 25th, at the age of sixty-six, after a somewhat lingering illness. He leaves to mourn a bereaved widow, three daughters and four sons: Mary, Annie, Clara, Oswald, David, John and Daniel, all of whom were with him during his last illness, with the exception of David, who is principal of Maple Ridge High School, B.C. He was predeceased by three sons, two of whom made the supreme sacrifice in the Great War. The late Mr. Fraser was a highly respected citizen and possessed a warm-hearted, generous disposition. He always assumed an unselfish attitude towards his fellow man, and he leaves behind him a career worthy of high esteem. The funeral was held on Monday, November 28th, and was largely attended. In the absence of the deceased's pastor, Rev. J. D. McKenzie, Montague, the services were conducted by Rev. Mr. McLellan, pastor of Valleyfield, Presbyterian Church. The remains were laid to rest in Lower Montague Cemetery beside those of his son, Armas, who predeceased him six years ago.

RETURNS FROM WEST.—Mr. John Williams, Prince St., has returned from an interesting three months' trip to Western Canada, where he visited his son Fred at Calgary and James at Fort George, B.C. The many friends of Fred and "Jim" in this city will be pleased to learn that they are doing well in the West. Mr. Williams, during his visit, met many Islanders, and his reception everywhere was a cordial one. After his return to Charlottetown he left for a brief visit to Kensington and Summerside.

INTERESTING ADDRESS.—The Assembly Hall of the Cathedral was crowded to the doors, on Monday evening, December 5th, when Mr. C. G. Duffy delivered the third of a series of educational talks to the members of the Catholic Women's league; the speakers who preceded him being His Lordship Bishop O'Leary in October and Rev. Dr. McLellan in November. Speaker Duffy, who had chosen for his subject "The Constitution of Prince Edward Island and our Relation to Canada," held the close attention of his audience from beginning to end. Speaking of acts passed during the early sessions of the Legislature, Mr. Duffy said: "Some of the Acts have expired but are of great interest on account of the subjects with which they deal. Perhaps the subject most frequently dealt with in all our Legislature has been with regard to the Liquor Traffic. In the first session of the Legislature, 1775, an Act was passed prohibiting the sale (by retail) of rum or other distilled or spirituous liquors without first having a license for that purpose, and for the due regulations of such as shall be licensed." In 1781 an Act was passed "for raising a fund to make and keep in repair the streets and wells of Charlottetown; also an Act to prevent disorderly riding of horses and driving of carts, trucks and sleds or any other carriage whatsoever within Charlottetown." Another Act, passed the same year, "declaring that the happiness of slaves did not exempt them from bondage," brings home to us the sad fact that slaves were bought and sold on our island. When the speaker concluded, Mrs. F. J. Casey, in a few well chosen words of praise, moved the vote of thanks, which was seconded by Mrs. G. J. McCormack.
