Yesterday morning, Hon. A. C. Saunders, the retiring Premier of this Province, who has been elevated to the Supreme Court Bench, was waited upon by the Liberal members of the Legislature and presented with a gold-headed cane and an address signed by all the members. The address was read by Mr. L. R. Allen and every member spoke briefly, extending congratulations to Hon. Mr. Saunders and making reference to the cordial relations which have existed between himself and the members of the House.

Hon. Mr. Saunders made an eloquent and appreciative reply. The address was as follows: Charlottetown, P. E. I. May 20, 1930.

To The Honourable Albert Charles Saunders: Your fellow members of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Prince Edward Island have met in this historic Chamber today to honour you on the occasion of your elevation to the Supreme Court Bench of this province.

During the years you have been leader of the Liberal Party of this Province, you have endeared yourself in the minds and hearts of your followers. LONDON, May 20.—The revolt of the woman who has tried to grow her hair again and does not like it is the latest phase of the war in the world of fashion, which was already busy with the battle of the long and short skirt. Hairdressing saloons in the West End of London are filled with women having their straggly ends of net-grown hair shorn again to a trim shingle. They declare that nothing will induce them to return to hairpins and "buns." Hairpins with ball ends so that they cannot scratch or irritate the scalp are offered as an inducement to women to grow their hair again, and many kinds of clips designed to hold untidy pieces in place are now on the market.

The "coalheaver" and "sowwester" hats that are so popular were designed to hide hair growing again on the nape of the neck where it had been cut. But women are not greatly impressed. For sport, for swimming, and for business, short hair remains the most practical fashion.

PREMIER LEA TOOK OFFICE YESTERDAY

Resignation of Hon. A. C. Saunders From Leadership of Government.

Hon. A. C. Saunders, recently appointed Judge of the Supreme Court, at 2 p. m. yesterday, called upon His Honour Lieutenant Governor Heartz, accompanied by Mr. H. R. Stewart, clerk of the Executive Council and tendered the resignation of himself as Premier and also the resignation of members of his government.

He recommended as his successor Hon. Walter M. Lea.

These resignations were accepted by His Honour who called upon Hon. Mr. Lea to form a government.

Later in the afternoon His Honour proceeded to the Legislative Chamber accompanied by his private secretary where he administered the oath of office to the new Premier and the members of his government.

With the exception of the premier-ship there is no change from the former personnel.

The office of Attorney General has yet to be filled.

Premier Lea was first elected to the Legislature in 1915. He was re-elected in 1919 and was Minister of Agriculture and Provincial Treasurer in the Bell Government. He was defeated in the general election of 1923 and was again returned in 1927 with the Saunders administration. He represents the Fourth District of Prince.

Premier Lea comes from a family that is highly esteemed and respected throughout Prince Edward Island. His father, the late Hon. W. C. Lea, was a former member of the Legislative Assembly, and his two brothers, Richard S. and William S., Montreal, are engineers of international fame. Mr. Lea himself has been very successful as a stock breeder and general farmer.

New Industry Making Money

BOSTON, Mass., May 20.—Tuna fishing, which has been long looked upon hereabouts as nothing more than a sporting proposition for rod-and-line deep sea angling enthusiasts is rapidly taking its place as a commercially important project.

From June until October large schools of this particular kind of fish range from Massachusetts Bay to Nova Scotia and for no other reason than the inexplicable prejudice that the American people hold against some kinds of edible fish, they have, until recent years, been completely overlooked as a potential money making industry.

The giant tuna is the largest fish that swims these waters with the possible exception of one or two species of shark. It reaches a length of 14 feet or more and a weight of 1500 to 1600 pounds. However, the majority of those brought to market run from 400 to 800 pounds.

There is very little known of the habits and coming and goings of the giant tuna because in the past our scientists felt it would be a waste of time studying a species of fish which had no market value. This line of reasoning has proved false and ichthyologists are now probing Mr. Tuna's past performances with a view to getting better acquainted.

The giant tuna has come to be regarded not only as an excellent food fish, either canned or fresh like swordfish, but it also commands a fair price. Fishermen are paid from five to ten cents a pound for their catch and considering the poundage a good day's pay could easily be obtained with just a few tuna.

Canada is a lap ahead of the United States in developing its tuna fishery. The New England fishermen operate from small boats equipped with "pupils" from which the striker hurls his harpoon at the fish. While this method is still used in some of the Canadian waters, the more modern Canadian fishermen use traps to land this prize.

British Rule In India

GUELPH, Ont., May 20.—Vindication of British rule and Christian missionary activity in India was voiced in the address delivered by Dr. Margaret MacKellar returned missionary from Neechum, India, before the Guelph Presbyterian Women's Missionary Society. WITCH DOCTORS. COME UNDER BAN

PRETORIA, South Africa, May 20.—(By The Canadian Press)—Witch doctors are going to find it hard to make a living in Swaziland, where they have practised with some success for many generations. Under a new law any witch doctor or his agent practising divination, is liable to a year's imprisonment. Anyone found wearing charms, dress or insignia of a wizard will be liable to six months' imprisonment. Moreover, any trustful native who seeks the aid of a witch doctor may find himself cast in jail for a year.

One case which had an effect in bringing about the restrictions was reported recently. A witch doctor and a native woman killed another native woman, cutting the victim into "medicine meat," which was found buried in 14 fields with the idea of increasing the crops.

SHOULD WORK FOR PEACE

EDMONTON, Alta., May 20.—(By The Canadian Press)—"I do not advocate that we should abolish our armies and navies, for we and the remainder of the world need protection until such time as the wolves among the nations are finally eliminated," Magistrate Murphy said recently. "At the same time we should work for peace. Say it with a positive aggressive sound. There is something negative and lackadaisical about the world's peace, as the average person says it. While I say that invasion by another power is the only excuse for a country resorting to arms, I qualify that too by adding 'until such time as the matter is passed upon the League of Nations.'"
