**AUTHOR'S** Day will be observed tomorrow by the advanced classes of Prince Street School from 12.30 to 2 o'clock p. m. The author being studied will be W. C. Bryant. The members of the school will be pleased to see any interested friends at the exercise.

**MUCH** sympathy is felt for Hugh McMillan of New Haven who arrived home last evening via the Cape bringing the remains of his son George who recently died of appendicitis at the Montreal General Hospital. The funeral will take place at 2.30 Saturday afternoon from his home New Haven to the Clyde River Cemetery.

**THE** burial took place Wednesday morning of an eleven months old child of John Savidin, Douglas Street, from diphtheria. The danger of spreading of the disease is small as the eight children and four adults of the family have been immunized and the house fumigated by the Health Officer and Dr. Kelly. They will be released from quarantine in a few days.

**A FEW** evenings since Rev. A. F. Brown of North River was the subject of a vigorous pounding about fifty people taking part in the exercise, mostly young people, with a few middle aged. The pounds consisted of almost everything conceivable in the eating line and very materially replenished the Pastor's larder. A very enjoyable evening was spent in games and social intercourse. A bountiful supper was served by the intruders and altogether the evening was a most satisfactory one.

**POINTS ON LAWN MAKING.** A rich soil is one of the essentials to success. No matter what the extent of the lawn, it should be evenly moist and well drained. The general slope should be away from the residence on all sides. Seeding the lawn fields better results than sodding. Kentucky blue-grass is the most satisfactory known seed for the majority of locations but in the South, Bermuda grass, St. Lucia and Texas blue-grasses extensively employed. April is a good time in the North, to sow, before the usual light showers. The ground should be raked as nearly perfect as possible before sowing. Best results are obtained by sowing thickly. Four bushels to the acre is the usual allowance, but in small plots double the proportion may be used to advantage. After sowing work seed into the soil with a rake. No clipping should be done till the grass is above three inches in height, and it should be kept at about this height during the first summer. Avoid clipping at all soon before frost is expected.—From The Delinestor for March.

**THE** annual meetings were recently held in the three sections of the Presby. terian Congregation of Marshfield, Covehead and Brackley Point Road of which the Rev. W. H. Spencer is minister. The reports showed a year of good work and indicated encouraging prospects. Nineteen members were received—twelve on profession of faith and seven by certificate. Twenty-five received the ordinance of baptism. During fourteen months twenty-three deaths occurred. The finances are in a healthy condition. For 1902 the total receipts netted \$2342.82 and the total disbursements \$2296.40 balances in several hands netting \$76.42. \$226.00 were given to the schemes of the church. Improvements were put upon the Marshfield church to the amount of \$1549.00 of which \$948.00 were paid and the balance is secured with the exception of \$325.00. This section voted \$50.00 additional to stipend. Steps are now being taken toward improvements on the churches at Covehead and Brackley Point during the coming summer.

**THE** north entrance to the Post Office was in a shocking condition yesterday and people could only reach the Building by wading knee deep in slush.

**THE** Messrs Lane Bros., of Southport have just received an importation of Suffolk sheep from England. This is a new breed of sheep in the Maritime Provinces. They are a large framed sheep with fine wool, clean headed with head and legs as black as ink. At the Smithfield carcass competition this year this breed swept the board winning 1st, 2nd, and 3rd in short woolled lambs, 1st, 2nd short woolled shearlings also 1st and 2nd, at the Edinburg Fat Stock show and were reserved for the Prince of Wales cup at Smithfield. There is no breed of sheep in England that has come to the front during the last ten years so much as the Suffolk. They are considered by connoisseurs to be without exception the best mutton sheep in the world.

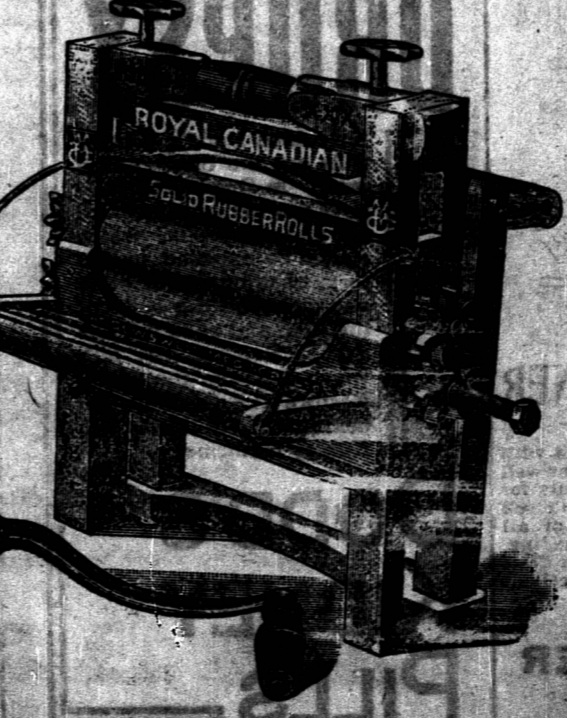
