New London Church
Celebrates 120th.
Anniversary

The first of a series of special
services, commemorating the 120th
anniversary of the opening of the
first church in the parish of New
London in the Church of Saint
Thomas, was held on Sunday
morning, June 26th, 1949, when
the sacrament of Holy Commu-
nion was dispensed by the rector,
the Reverend Sidney J. Davis,
B.A. A downpour of rain prevented
many who would have attended
this service, and the congregation
was small. However, under partially
clearer skies, in the evening, every
corner of the historic church
was occupied by members of the
church, and friends of all denom-
inations, while many were forced
to remain outside. The beauty of
the newly decorated interior was
further enhanced by beautifully
arranged bouquets of Spring flow-
ers. The rector, organist and choir
of St. Paul's, Charlottetown, were
in attendance as well as the Rev.
H.E. Dysart, B.A., Dean of Resi-
dential, King's University, Halifax,
who read the lessons. The choir,
St. Paul's choir, under the direc-
tion of the organist, Mr. Royston
T. Muford, A.R.C.O., presented
his anthem, "O, Hearken, Thou O
Lord, (Alfred Whitehead) and sang
in the singing of hymns, appropri-
ate to the occasion. The incumb-
ent, Rev. Mr. Davis, extended a
warm welcome to all who had come
from other churches to worship at
St. Thomas. He announced a ser-
vice of Holy Communion for
Thursday morning, preceding
Lichfield and D.C.S. and W.A.
semi-annual meetings at Kenning-
ton, also a service of Thanksgiv-
ing, for Sunday, July 3rd. The re-
ctor also took this opportunity to
express publicly his appreciation of
the work done by the members of
St. Thomas, who had completely
re-decorated the church with vol-
untary labour, and said: "It is a
great privilege and a happy privi-
lege to be associated with the
members of this church." Greet-
ings were read from the Rev. Don-
ald A. Campbell, of the Geddie Mem-
orial Church, New London, and
from former rectors of the parish,
Archdeacon A.W. Watson, Halifax,
Rev. C.W. Neish, Fort Dufferin, N.S., Rev. G.T.
Spriggs, Quebec, Rev. B. Freeman,
Halifax and Rev. D.E. Noel, St.
John's, Nfld. In conclusion, he
thanked the rector, organist and
choir of St. Paul's and the Rev.
Mr. Dysart, for their very appreci-
able assistance.

Historical Review

One of the wardens, Mr. Ivan
Duggan, read an interesting sum-
mary of the church's history,
taken from a History of the Church
compiled by Rev. Thomas Reagh
Millman, (himself a namesake of a
former rector, Rev. T.B. Reagh)
and edited by Mrs. J.G. Townsend;
in 1829 the church was opened
for divine service by Rev. William
Walker of St. Elean-
or's, 1833 marked the
point when the church was
dedicated to the service of the
Rev. T.H. Walpole, in 1836 the
church was consecrated by Bishop
Inglis on his first visit to P.E. Is-
land. In 1853 a rectory was built
for Rev. William Meek and his
family. In 1875 the present church
was erected. Rev. D. Fitzgerald
of St. Paul's, Charlottetown, was
the preacher at the opening service.
Of the twenty-five names of rec-
tors, serving the church, since the
first recorded services were held
in the hopes of church members
in 1821, perhaps the most interest-
ing to recall is that of Rev. Wil-
liam Meek who was rector from
1853 to 1861, and in whose time
the church at Burlington was
erected. For the Rev. Mr. Meek
left behind him in the parish a
son and succeeding generations
bear the name, "which is among
the most honored names in the
parish." Four of his children are
vestry, and their children in the
Sunday school are growing up to
carry on the family traditions.

The Rev. J. T. Abbott was
the preacher at the service, which
brought greetings from St. Paul's,
Charlottetown. Taking for his
text, the words, "The Glory of this
name shall be greater than the
name of the former," Hagai 2: 9, he
called that as the Jews were about
to rebuild the temple at Jerusalem,
and so through Hagai, they were
given a vision of what might be.
The look forward to the completion
of the temple can be applied to the
church today, and to this church,
which has been cared for and
made more beautiful as the years
go by.

The speaker told of being
associated, during the past week
with the 200th anniversary of St.
Paul's, Halifax, "whose beams are
just as strong and just as level, as
when placed there, 200 years ago."
Though not so old, "right in this
community, this church has with-
nessed for Christ — for many gen-
erations, and I wonder how many
there are who have not appreciat-
ed the value of it as they should."
He said, "On this anniversary, we
would pay homage to the founders
of a great heritage of church and
state in this country, there ought
to be great unity, and they ought
not." He went on to speak of these
days of crises, and continued "Days
of crises are days of opportunity.
The world needs the church, today
more than ever before. — many
great movements start in rural
communities—you have your oppor-
tunities." Concluding, he recom-
mended the people of St. Thomas
on the well kept cemetery beside
the church.

In the cemetery of which the
visiting rector spoke so favorably
are headstones, new out of native
red field stones and of such great
size that in some cases much of the
inscriptions cannot be deciphered.
Of special note is one bearing the
inscription — In Memory of Francis
Pillman, who died Dec. 17th, 1853,
age 87 of Exeter, England who im-
migrated to the Island in 1812 af-

Mr. Harold L. Rodd, secretary
of the Summerside Board of Trade

study of industrial activities, town

was designed as a refresher course

merce.

D. L. Morrell, executive secre-
tary of the Canadian Institute for
Commerce, in announcing the open-
ing of the school said: "The
Board of Trade or Chamber of
Commerce secretary occupies the
most important position in the drive
for increasing community welfare
and for the preservation of our
free enterprise way of life. The
Institute for Board and Chamber
Secretaries offers a course of in-
struction to bring himself up to date
on new techniques in his profes-
sion and to discuss his problems
with others engaged in the same
work."
