(Continued from page 1) bus services in this Province until the undermentioned facts have been given his careful consideration.

1. That the railway services in this Province are completely inadequate even for civilian requirements, and unless augmented by efficient bus services will unquestionably retard the Province's war effort.

2. That bus services in this Province operate on an average of seven months in the year, whereas many other sections of the country services are maintained the year around.

3. That one of two entrances to the Province, the Prince Edward Island-Nova Scotia ferry is served only by bus service or privately owned motor cars.

4. That no passenger trains or passenger airplanes operate on the route between the Borden-Tormentine car ferry to bus services or privately owned cars.

5. That the presently existing bus services are being forwarded by mail. Moved by James T. McKee, seconded by J. E. Blanchard.

ever short distances to materially decrease the shortage caused by the very great enlistment from this Province.

That 25 per cent of the total passengers on the various bus services in this Province is made up of members of the armed forces, and that for these men living west of the city of Charlottetown the discontinuance of bus services would reduce the period of their leave spent at home by two days. This is advanced as an especially important consideration by the Capital City of a Province which now numbers over 10 per cent of its total population in the Navy, the Army and the Air Force.

7. That without any further curtailment of bus services gasoline consumption in this province has been reduced proportionally more than any other province.

8. That it is further resolved that this resolution accompanied by a brief explaining and elaborating upon the facts set forth in this resolution be forwarded to the Transit Controller under the signature of the Mayor of Charlottetown and that the Transit Controller shall be immediately advised by telegram that this resolution and accompanying brief are being forwarded by mail.
