CLOSING EXERCISES OF PRINCE STREET SCHOOL.

The classes will be examined by the teachers in the class rooms. There not being any assembly hall the prizes and trustees' certificates will be delivered by the trustees in the several class rooms commencing at 10.30 a. m.

His Honor Lieut. Governor McIntyre and several other prominent citizens will assist in the distribution of prizes.

QUEEN SQUARE SCHOOL.

The closing exercises of Queen Square School will be from 9 to 10 a. m. His Honor Lieut. Governor McIntyre will be present and will present the Governor General's bronze medal. A lesson will be given in each department by the teacher. There will also be other exercises by the pupils and exhibitions of drawing, writing, &c. Afterwards the pupils will march from the building to the school grounds in fire drill. On the school grounds the pupils will give an exhibition of military drill.

West Kent St. School will have its closing exercises from 12 to 1 o'clock.

The Governor General's medal will be awarded to Athol Seaman. The Trustees' Certificate will be presented in each department by Chairman Blanchard and Secretary E. Stewart. This year one diploma for writing will be given in each room. Lessons will be taught in each department by the teachers, and in some instances short programmes of music and recitations will be carried out. The pupils will not mass in the hall this year, but remain in their several departments. Addresses are expected in the Principal's room from Mr. Blanchard, Dr. Anderson and T. C. James, Esq.

HIBBERT TUPPER'S

Charges Against the Yukon Officials.

A ROYAL COMMISSION

Asked For—Will Prove them or Quit Public Public Life—Drummond Bill.

OTTAWA, June 28.—(Special)—The Conservative Senators discussed the Drummond Bill and the Grand Trunk agreement and decided to again discuss them both together.

The following is the substance of Sir Hibbert Tupper's Yukon charges, submitted yesterday. He asked that a Royal Commission of two Judges be appointed to investigate them, and affirmed that if he failed to prove them he would retire permanently from public life.

That Sir John shown favoritism in giving dredging licenses and liquor permits to men who had been partners of his, some of whom hailed from fictitious residences.

That Sir John wrongfully gave Wade permission to trade in mining licenses; That Mulock was guilty of gross neglect in making postal arrangements; That the neglect of the government has created insalubrious conditions in the Yukon;

That Commissioner Walsh was guilty of misbehavior in office, of favoritism and of liaison with Lucille Elliott; and that this Lucille was given special advantage in locating claims and was allowed to keep her saloon open Sunday;

That Walsh illegally and vindictively interfered with the legal permits issued by the North West government;

That various officials of the government in the Yukon were guilty of blackmail, selling information, "side-door influence," fraud and concealment of facts;

That Wade, while legal adviser of the commissioner, was personally interested in the privileges and concessions given by the commissioners;

That the timber inspectors were interested in the timber leases;

That a timber lease, granted and paid for, was taken away from the lessee on the excuse that it was needed for the people of Dawson, after which that timber was sold to private parties, who made a net profit of \$5,000 out of it;

That the commission to Walsh was illegally issued;

That Walsh was permitted to unduly delay his departure for the Yukon;

That he was not a fit man for the position of commissioner;

That McGregor and Norwood appointed mining inspectors, were incompetent men, and Norwood an American citizen.
