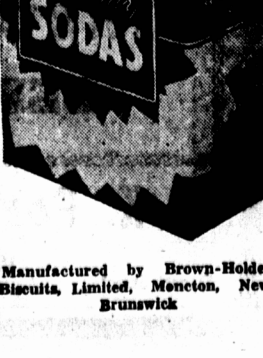

That Body Of Yours (Continued from Page 2) led in order to demonstrate the type of virus concerned, and to show the difference between outbreaks of influenza and other diseases which occur about the same time of year in certain climates. In the past epidemics of influenza, a virus infection, have occurred in certain communities and appeared to miss others, so the number of percentage of cases in a community and also in the general population was studied. It was found that the number of specimens in the laboratory showing the virus was in direct proportion to the number of cases present in the community. "There was evidence of periodicity of the influenza virus infection with cycles at well-defined intervals." This meant that an epidemic could be expected at a certain time whether it would be mild or severe could not be predicted. Fortunately, a number of volunteers in the military forces volunteered to be inoculated with cultures of influenza virus developed during the war in order to find if this gave protection against influenza. The results provided a basis for field trials of its protection.

W.C.T.U. NOTES

CAN ANYONE DRINK AND HURT ONLY HIMSELF?

In the Toronto Star recently, a letter appeared from one who said, "I can look back over 60 years of the making and selling of alcohol and the evils thereof." Surely such an experience entitles a man to speak on the drink problem. "I know of the wrecked homes, the murders, the accidents, the prison terms the blighted prospects and the distress that often comes with excessive drinking. I have never seen one person who was tabbed as a drinker receive promotion or advancement in any walk of life. But I have seen many relegated to the ranks of the unemployed for this reason. The head of an organization that has a coast-to-coast set up a man who has seen thousands of employees come and go in his 40 years of business life, tells me that not once did a drinking man receive advancement or any favorable consideration whatsoever. Many men who might take a drink themselves refuse to consult a doctor, a lawyer or any other consultant that has a reputation as a drinker. Another man who has always had a large number of workmen under his supervision has been forced to but one conclusion on the drink question, which he expresses tersely and forcibly when he says, "The smarter people don't drink liquor."

RETURN OF PROHIBITION IS URGED

MIDDLETON.—Return of prohibition in the province was urged at a picnic-rally of the L. W. Elliott District Division, Sons of Temperance, Annapolis County, held at Margareville. Miss Cora Elliott daughter of the late temperance leader in Annapolis County, in whose honor the District Division has been named, presented a resolution, which was seconded by E. R. Wade and passed. "Whereas alcohol is an appetite creating poison the use of which as a beverage is followed by unnumbered evils. Therefore we believe its nature should be fully taught in our schools. And whereas government control, so called, has proved an utter failure; commencing the liquor traffic, increasing the use of liquor to an alarming extent and making of every citizen of Nova Scotia a liquor seller. Therefore be it resolved that we urge the Government of Nova Scotia to secure the repeal of the Government Control Act; close all of its liquor stores; cancel all permits and enact and enforce legislation forbidding the sale of all alcoholic beverages within the province."

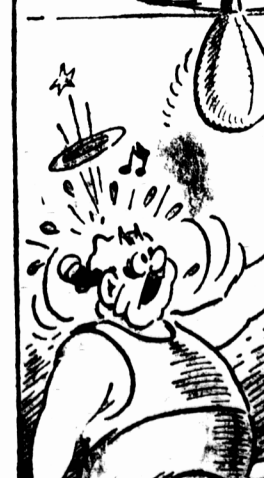

who use alcohol. It does occur MORE COMMONLY to those who use alcohol to excess. This interesting item from The 1944 Bulletin of the Academy of Medicine, Paris, France, is quoted in the March, 1946, Quarterly Journal of Studies on Alcohol. "While total admissions to the Bichat Hospital in Paris have remained approximately constant in the years between 1938 and 1944, admission for alcoholic cirrhosis have dropped from 22 and 24 in 1938 and 1939, to 5 and 3 in 1943 and 1944 respectively. The decrease is attributed to the lower consumption of wine, spirits and aperitifs." Sources of information: Alcohol and Human Life by Courtenay C.
