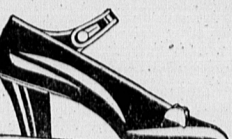

THE LORDS VETO QUESTION.

LONDON, June 17.—Premier Asquith and Mr Balfour, Leader of the Opposition, have held several important meetings during the week, and an agreement between them has been reached with reference to holding a conference on the Question of the Veto of the House of Lords.

The Conference will probably be composed of the Premier, Earl of Crewe, Lloyd George, and Augustus Barril, representing the Government and Mr Balfour, Lord Lansdowne and Austin Chamberlain, on behalf of the Opposition.

EARL GREY IN LONDON.

LONDON, June 17.—Earl Grey, interviewed on his arrival here, declared that Canada is making great strides towards full Nationhood. He said that the whole country is prospering, and that the Maritime Provinces are fully equal to the West in every respect, as a field for new settlers.

Canada, he declared, is more Imperial than England itself, and it is the duty of the Mother Country to safeguard this strong Imperial sentiment, which, is of so great importance.

TORONTO, June 17.—Forest fires threatened the Millia Lines at Peawawa Camp grounds yesterday and the soldiers had to turn out and fight the flames. They won after hard fighting.
