By a private letter from Mr. J.R. Carr, it is learned that he has been nominated for a judgeship in a new circuit comprising Cass & Van Buren Counties, Michigan. The election for this office takes place April 3rd, and Mr. Carr's many friends on the Island will anxiously await the result. The following clipping from the Dowagoy Daily News, of March 14th, is the speech with which Mr. Carr accepted the nomination. Mr. Carr is a brother of Mr. G. W. Caar, Lot 16.

I thank you for this nomination; I thank you for this recognition and if it ends with the nomination, still I will thank you.

My candidacy for the high office dates back to the birth of this judicial district, and in popular parlance, I have been "in it" ever since. Cass county is a small county. She is not even honored in the act creating the new district; being named alphabetically, Van Buren being named first. Berrien county always regarded Cass as the little boy in knee breeches, and therefore I specially thank the delegates from Van Buren for this honor tendered me here today. I regret that as a party we are in the minority in Cass and Van Buren counties, but if the idea of expansion was to extend and include sufficient republican votes, with our own, then your nominee would undoubtedly be judge of the new territory.

The judgeship is not a political office. It is above politics and should be non-partisan, in every sense of the term. The legislature so regarded it, in placing the elections in the spring of the year, away from party politics, and the fact that the Supreme Court of Michigan is composed solely of republican judges is no argument in favor of a partisan court.

I am opposed to the second term among the judges. I don't believe in the unwritten law which declares that a judge must be his own successor and occupy a seat on the bench for a period of at least twelve or twenty years as the case may be; but I do not believe in a law to the effect that no judge, circuit or supreme, could hold a second term. The many duties resting upon the shoulders of the circuit judge are by no means trifling; but upon the contrary they are very important and far-reaching, touching every home. The court itself should be conducted on business like principles with justice and economy the controlling elements. A dilatory judge makes unnecessary expense for the taxpayers as well as for the litigant.

If I am elected to this high office, and I hope I may be, I shall give my entire time and best ability to the discharge of its important duties, regardless of politics or favoritism; but upon the other hand, if I am unsuccessful in the race, I will doff my hat to my republican opponent and continue to love the profession I glory to be called a member of. In conclusion, I thank you again.

Resisting Power Of Snow.

Some experiments were made recently in France on the penetrative power of bullets through snow. The results were astonishing. The Lebel rifle was used, and at a distance of 160 feet the bullet penetrated only five feet into the snow target. A bullet from a Lebel rifle has been known, it is said, to go through a tree of three and one-half feet in diameter; presumably through the full length of the diameter; that it should penetrate only eighteen inches farther into such soft stuff as snow seems altogether startling. The explanation suggested by the experimentalists is that the rotating bullet picks up particles of snow as it goes in and so gets "ballad" or blocked up. The result is curious enough to encourage further experiment. One would like to know, for instance, whether a non-rotating ball from a smooth bore would show better penetration, as it should on the theory advanced. These are not experiments without a practical value. A knowledge of the defensive resistance of a snow wall to the impact of rifle bullets might be of the greatest value.

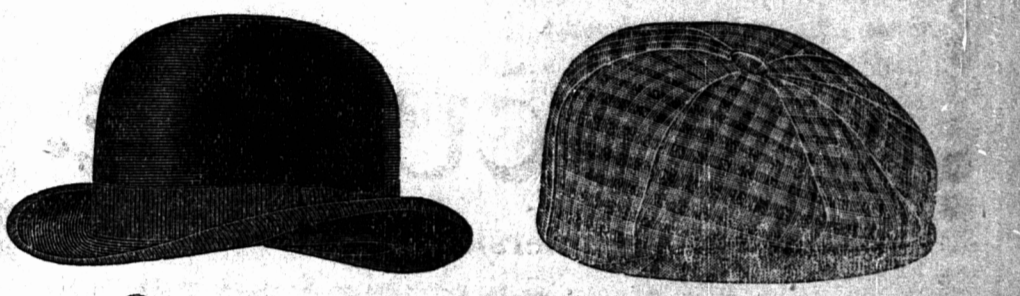
