A BAFFLING PROBLEM

In today's deal, West was more to be pitied than blamed for not finding the successful line of defence.

The bidding:

Needless to say, South did not bid five clubs with any serious hope of making that contract, but even as a sacrifice effort, the bid was extremely questionable. Surely, South could not count on finding his partner with so much usable material, including a doubleton diamond, three trumps to the queen and not only the heart ace but a heart suit which, though not intrinsically valuable, was a terrible threat to the enemy when it came to discovering the right line of defence.

West opened the spade jack, but when the dummy went down and East let him hold the trick, there was plenty to think about! It was virtually certain that South had no more spades; the burning question was: was his "outside" strength in hearts or in diamonds? As may be seen after a scrutiny of the above hands, a shift to the ace and another trump by West would have insured three tricks for the defence, but from West's point of view that shift was highly dangerous. South was pretty well marked with at least seven clubs; he might have the king-queen, or at least the king-small of hearts, and be able to run the entire heart suit.

After much pondering, West decided that the safest plan was to go out for a diamond trick, through the king-queen, or at least the king or king-queen. To that end West shifted to diamonds—and the lucky South player was practically presented with the contract, ruffing his two low diamonds with the three and queen of clubs.
