SUPREME COURT.—At the Supreme Court yesterday forenoon the case of Patrick McKenna came up before the three judges. This was an adjourned hearing of an application for leave to appeal to the Privy Council on the decision of the Court granting the writ of Certiorari on the ground that section 52 of the Prohibition Act was ultra vires notwithstanding the amendment of 1922. Mr. Bentley counsel for the Prohibition Prosecutor asked for leave to withdraw his application, as the Act had been amended this session. Mr. Inman, counsel for McKenna asked that costs be allowed his client in respect of this application. The Court granted Mr. Bentley's application for leave to withdraw the appeal and reserved judgment in the matter of costs.

ALLEGED SWINDLER MENTALLY DERANGED.—NEW YORK, April 24.—Maurice Sternback, charged in London with complicity in swindling the Russian Grand Duchess Xenia Alexandrovna, sister of the former Czar, of jewels worth \$60,000 is shut away from everybody except his attendants at the Rivercrest Sanitarium, Astoria, L.I., the head physician, Dr. Doid said today. Dr. Doid intimated that Sternback would be mentally unable to give a lucid statement concerning the charge, even if the hospital authorities did not forbid visitors to him. The patient is said to be a partner of Albert Frederick Calvert, against whom the Grand Duchess Xenia Alexandrovna recently secured a judgment in England as the result of the alleged swindle.

EXPECTS OCCUPATION WILL LAST FOUR YEARS.—BERLIN, April 24.—A vigorous protest against the expulsion of the German Rhineland commissioner Count Von Hatzfeldt by the French without the knowledge of the British members of the Inter-Allied Rhineland Commission will be launched by Great Britain in a day or two, according to information received from a source close to the British embassy in Berlin. In British diplomatic circles here it is feared that an unpleasant Anglo-French incident will result from the French action. The French, it is felt here, are planning to remain in the Ruhr district for years. Some weeks ago the French military authorities issued to American newspaper correspondents passes good until Dec. 31 next. When asked about the situation in the Ruhr district a high allied officer said "I expect the French occupation to last at least four years."

Cook Wins Bout From Goddard

LONDON, April 24.—George Cook, the Australian heavyweight champion, outpointed Frank Goddard, the English heavyweight, in their twenty round bout at the National Sporting Club tonight. Cook was too quick and clever for his opponent and scored well with left leads to the face. He frequently drove Goddard to the ropes and landed left and right hooks to the jaw. Goddard was occasionally dangerous with his right swings but on the whole was outboxed.

Maritime Athletes Have Chance For Olympic Team

ST. JOHN, N. B., April 23.—A group of representative citizens conferred with P. J. Mulqueen, Chairman of the Canadian Olympic committee on Saturday afternoon when Mr. Mulqueen explained the purpose and scope of the committee and A. W. Covey told of the Maritime plans for the coming Olympic games. A general discussion followed, in which general approval was expressed of the idea of bringing athletes from these provinces to the front, not as winners necessarily, but as competent representatives of Canada and the Maritime Provinces. Mr. Mulqueen explained that for several years the Olympic committee had been composed of practically the same men. They had done their work well, but it was hardly consistent with democratic principles that the same men should hold office year after year. For this reason a change in the personnel had taken place and a committee of five had been selected. The idea was to represent all sections, east, west and central. Each province also would have its own athletic committee which would function particularly with regard to the Olympics. The Canadian team should consist of eighty five men, but this would entail great expense. It was probable that the number would be reduced to sixty-five. Concerning possible members of the team, he remarked that in sculling, Hilton Belyea, of St. John was Canada's best bet.

prove of the Movement and they also approve of football. It is competition against colleges in which a few pupils devote a great deal of their time to athletic sports is disapproved of nowadaya by college professors. Two things regarding the progress of young men in this Province Mr. Higgs believed to be the lack of fresh air and lack of sleep. The Conservatives have admitted established the School Supply but the first time the school books were got at cost was under the premiership of Mr Justice Haszard. Since that time the expenditure has increased. The Leader of the Opposition in criticizing the highways scheme, had, Mr. Higgs contended, practically admitted that he approved of ninety percent of the work, because fifty per cent has been for permanent work and forty per cent is being done at the expense of the Dominion Government. The Liberals had spent \$648,000 on these roads and had borrowed only \$300,000. Visitors have been loud in praise of these dirt roads. The government had done valuable experimental work in connection with gravel surfaced road work in the approaches to the city. The essential thing about the roads is the question of upkeep. Mr. Higgs believed this was too much for any government to handle. The country people would have to look after the roads themselves. Prizes might be given for the best stretch of road in the Province. The people could be satisfied that if there is money to be spent this year on the roads it will be spent honestly, because Honest Cyrus Crosby was on the job. The expenditure at Falconwood had been brought up. In 1919 it was \$118,000 and some odd dollars and in 1922 and some odd thousand odd dollars less, under the Liberals. MR. STEWART. What about the intervening years? MR. HIGGS said there might be some slight difference, taking it that way, but it should be remembered that an increase of twenty-five percent in wages had been given. The doctor and attendants were doing a noble work and the raise in salaries was only fair. The future of this institution furnishes a problem because it will either need to be enlarged, or have the infirmary added to it and a new infirmary built. In the Provincial Building the Conservatives had had the clerks and officials working on starvation wages and so the Bell Government raised them forty per cent, at the same time increasing their working hours. The member from Cardigan had doubled the Liberal surplus and had referred to a hundred million dollars in the parliament of Great Britain as a real surplus, though he had only read it out of a paper. The deficit had been cast on the Conservative deficit. It is said there is no record where any bonds were paid off, and the Government have been asked where the \$253,000 has gone. But there are other ways of reducing the debt without paying the bonds, by reducing the overdraft at the bank for instance. During the eight years the Conservatives were in power they went behind \$227,212 according to the external auditor whereas the Liberal party increased the debt only about \$200,000 admitting that the construction work on the roads is a part of the real debt; but separate from this, the Province is about \$100,000 better off than when they came in. He approved the policy of having public work done by our own people, and of spending the money when most needed. He quoted a heading from the Guardian April 8th with reference to Mr. Stewart's disclosure of the discrepancies between the report of the outside and provincial auditors. He denounced the statement conveyed in the Guardian's heading as false and damnable. Clerical errors will occur, but there was no piece in that report where this money was added up to show that it was included in the assets of liabilities. It was a serious thing that children should be brought up to believe from the papers that the public men of the province are crooks and thieves. The greatest satisfaction he knew in life was that he had stayed the mauly part. Concluding he lauded the Commissioners of Agriculture and Public Works.

Floyd Johnson Outpointed Fulton

JERSEY CITY, April 24.—Floyd Johnson, the young western heavyweight, outpointed Fred Fulton, the "Moon Fixer" of Rochester, Minn. in their 12-round non-decision contest here tonight, in the opinion of a majority of the newspapermen at the ringside. Johnson kept on top of Fulton throughout eleven rounds, pummeling him almost at will, but weakened in the final round and appeared on the verge of being knocked out. Fulton's showing in the last round was not considered enough, however, to overcome the lead his young opponent had piled up in the early rounds. As the result of the newspapermen's decision, Johnson will be the opponent of Jess Willard, the former heavyweight champion, in a fifteen round match at Yankee Stadium on May 12.

MILLIONAIRES' PASTOR DIES A MILLIONAIRE

NEW YORK, April 24.—Rev. John R. Paxton, former pastor to Jay Gould, Russel Sage and other millionaires, died a millionaire himself. His daughter and sole heir Mary Paxton Hamlin, today filed in the Surrogate Court an application for letters of administration on his estate, valued at \$1,000,000 in personal property and \$160,000 in real estate. Dr. Paxton was pastor at the West Presbyterian Church, known as the "Gate to Heaven" of the millionaires, from 1882 to 1893.

LADY DOYLE TALKS PLAINLY TO THE MAYOR OF N. Y.

NEW YORK, April 24.—Mayor Hylan should stick to affairs of state and not embark on subjects concerning which he has no knowledge, is the opinion of Lady Doyle who today rebuked the city's chief executive for his recent attack on her husband, Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, now lecturing in the West. After watching a professional conjurer and deliver into telegraphic subjects a few days ago the mayor spoke on psychic phenomena as "hokum", suggested that Sir Arthur's success was due to his observation on the "faded nerves of society folk" and warned against seances and manifestations. Incidentally he referred to Sir Arthur as "that fellow Doyle." "The Mayor would be wise not to give an opinion upon a subject which he has never studied and therefore knows nothing about," said Lady Doyle. "Let him turn all his attention to his own job. I would recommend him to look to the condition of the streets of New York. I have travelled in twenty-three countries and I have never seen streets in such a disgraceful condition except in Constantinople." She ended her rebuke with the assertion that spiritualism would "sweep the world in spite of the foolish utterances of such men".

DEAD SKIPPER STEERS BOAT ON THE HUDSON

NEW YORK, April 24.—The motor boat Traveller, steered by a dead man with a bullet in his chest, was caught by longshoremen today as she emerged from beneath a pier in the Hudson river and headed for open water at full speed.

Its lone occupant lay on his back, across the steering wheel, his weight steadying its rudder. A pistol and two loaded cartridges were in the bottom of the craft. The absence of empty shells led the police to believe the man had been murdered.

Police hope to identify him through a license they issued last January.
