JEALOUS HUSBAND SHOT WIFE AND COUSIN

MONTREAL, Nov. 3.—Crazed with rage because his wife, Mrs. Mary Pauslik, had left him on account of his intemperate habits, Simon Pauslik, a Ruthenian laborer of Troy, N. Y., followed her to the city, and this morning after a protracted drinking bout shot her through the back and shot her cousin, Daniel Kurica, through the arm, when he intervened in her defence. He fired three shots in all at Kurica, but only one of them took effect. Mrs. Pauslik will live. Kurica's wound is not serious. Pauslik made his escape immediately after the shooting, and it is thought that he will endeavor to return to the United States.

GERMAN SPY SENTENCED IN LONDON.

EXETER, Ang., Nov. 3.—Lieutenant Philip M. Schultz, of the 13th Hussars, stationed at Frankfort-on-the-Main, was convicted at the Devonshire sittings today on the charge of spying. The German officer was sentenced by the Lord Chief Justice, Lord Alverston, to twenty months imprisonment. Lieutenant Schultz was arrested at Plymouth on August 19, last. It was alleged by the prosecution that he was specially commissioned by the German authorities to obtain information as to how far the British Government was supporting France in the dispute over Morocco. Attorney General Isaacs is prosecuting the case, contending that there could be no doubt that Schultz was in the pay of the German Government.

UNKNOWN SCHOONER LOST.

CHATHAM, Mass., Nov. 3.—A three-masted schooner sunk to her top-masts three miles west of Handkerchief Shoals, was discovered by the Life Savers of Monomoy Point today, but her name and the fate of her crew remained a mystery tonight. It is thought perhaps that the schooner went down after a collision with another vessel last night.

Whether the crew of half a dozen men were picked by the other vessel, or made their way in safety to the Handkerchief Lightship and are now there waiting to be taken off, or whether they went down with their craft, is not known.

The Revenue cutter Aechshnet, stationed at Woods Hole was notified tonight of the accident and will visit the wreck early in the morning.
