A GREAT PRO-BOER MEETING.

Faneuil Hall in Boston has been called "the Cradle of Liberty" and there a few nights ago a great meeting was held to express sympathy with the Boers in their present conflict with Britain. There was during the speaking a plentiful misrepresentation of the British people and Government and a ridiculous reiteration of the statement that the Boers are fighting for their liberties. All the speakers entirely ignored the facts that the Boers and not the British were the attacking party; that all the battles of the campaign so far have been fought on British soil, and that instead of Britain being checked in a vain effort to conquer the Dutch Republics it is the latter who are being driven back from their invasion of Cape Colony and Natal.

But even the pro-Boer speakers were driven to confess that in the face of the United States pushing a war of conquest in the Philippines they found some difficulty in being very severe upon Britain. One of their number, Hon. Geo. F. Williams, had before in the same hall denounced the war in the Philippines in unmeasured terms, and at the Boer meeting he felt compelled to say:

Now, this is a pro-Boer meeting. It is not an anti-English meeting, and I am glad of it. I am glad of it because when I am here apologizing in the name of American citizenship for my own government I will not hold a foreigner responsible until I know whether they also are misrepresented by their government. Unfortunately as a nation we can cast no slurs at any other nation which attacks the liberty of another people. Pray God that the time may come when we are so purged of our own offences that we may again speak words such as were spoken out of the mouths of Otis and Adams. But now, when we attempt to criticise England, we had better take plenty of time, because it will require a long time to take the beam out of our own eyes."

This speaker did well to remember that if there be a mote in John Bull's eye in regard to South Africa there is a very unmistakable beam in Uncle Sam's eye in Philippine affairs. For the only legal right which the United States has now to occupy the Philippines is derived by a purchase from Spain, after having denied Spain's right longer to rule in any of her colonies east or west.

One of the speakers denounced England as the modern Carthage and loudly called out in the language of Cato, "Let Carthage be destroyed," which sentiment we are told was greeted with "enthusiastic applause." Another compared the South African Republics to "a little pug dog fighting a battleworn English bull-dog," adding that in such case it was a mere insult to ask on which side American sympathies ought to be thrown. And still, if the little pug was so insolent and foolish as to nip the legs of the bull-dog one could hardly blame the latter for shaking him a little roughly! Another speaker professed to find a parallel between the Boers and the men of the Thirteen Colonies 125 years ago when they fought against taxation without representation. It might have occurred to this speaker, had he not been blinded by prejudice, that it is the Outlanders and not the Boers who have this claim to be contending for liberty.

Among the letters of regret from persons sympathetic with the Boer cause who had been invited to speak was one from Mr. Edwin D. Mead who felt it to be his duty to pay some small tribute to England. Among other things he wrote: "It is, I am sure, as lovers of England that the citizens of Boston will

meet tonight in Faneuil hall. More than any other people today I believe the English people are the custodians of civilization. The English power in the world is on the whole the greatest and the best power. That power is great just so far as, on the whole, it has been a power greater than any other in behalf of justice as it certainly has been. There is nothing more important with reference to the interests of the world in the century which we are about to enter than that England should be kept true to herself; that the true England should be kept strong and the false England be kept back and kept under."

When the fair, full moon rolls silent through the heavens, silencing the clouds she passes and moving the great ocean to a responsive throb beneath, men and women turn upward an admiring gaze. Strangely enough the unwonted splendor of the night will move some dogs to bark, but the moon moves serenely on her appointed course. So it is with "the world's greatest and best power." Shedding light, liberty and blessing wherever her influence extends, Britain moves on calmly to the accomplishment of her great, God-given destiny. The best thought of the world follows her stately onward march with intelligent admiration, and we need not wonder if at the same time some dogs are moved to howl.
