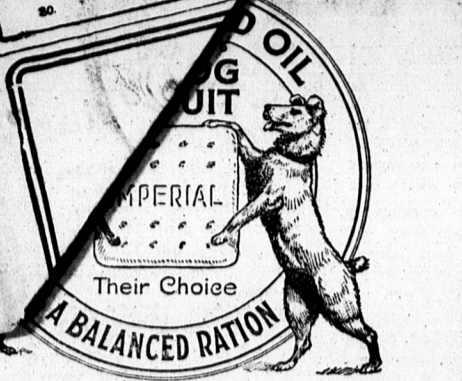

MONTRÉAL, April 12.—(Dominion livestock report)—Cattle receipts 676. There was a comparatively light run of cattle and several lots of good steers were included in the offering. One straight load of well finished steers averaging 1060 pounds was sold for \$7.75 and steers of equal or better quality but heavier weights were picked out at prices up to \$8.00.

Calf receipts, 1,625. Calves were lower, straight lots or ordinary quality calves sold from \$6 to \$6.50. A couple of small lots of better quality calves brought \$7.00 and a few hand-picked ones realized \$8.00, with an extreme top of \$9.50 paid for six choice veals. Commons calves brought five fifty.

Quotations: Good veal, \$7.00 to \$9.50, medium \$6.00 to \$6.50, common, \$5.50 to \$6.00. Sheep receipts, 69. Good light sheep sold for \$3.00 and very thin ones \$6.00 to \$7.00. Spring lambs sold for \$9.00 to \$14.00 each.

### East vs West Big League Pennant Winning

NEW YORK, April 13.—The ascendancy of eastern clubs in National and American League circuits in the past five years has helped to give the Atlantic seaboard a decided advantage over rivals in the Western ends of both circuits in pennant-winning achievements.

In this period, only one "Western" club—Pittsburgh—has broken up the streak of Eastern victories and in that instance the location is a matter of league location, not geographical.

Boston, helped by long periods of success in the early days of the National League, boasts the most pennant-winners, with thirteen in the senior circuit and six in the American League. The New York Giants are next in the National League with twelve pennants while the Philadelphia Athletics share the pennant-winning leadership with the Red Sox in the American with six.

Chicago has compiled by far the best record in the West, with eleven National League and five American League flags to its credit. St. Louis is the only present major league city which has not produced a pennant-winner.

### BASEBALL

"Of all sad words of tongue or pen, the saddest are—'Ugh!' uttered around the zero mark and baseball weather not even in the offing." But cheer up fans; old "King Sol" hasn't failed us yet, and baseball will be with us again—you bet!

This summer City League baseball, judging by present enthusiasm manifested has every indication of receiving the greatest impetus in the history of the game in this city; in fact local officials are looking forward to a Maritime title this fall. The material is here which just needs good coaching and strict attention to business.

### THE TEAMS

The situation in the different city sections this season is practically the same as last year, the champion Rovers perhaps being the hardest hit of the lot, in the losing of Cronin and Saunders from the outfield and "Dempsey" Diamond behind the bat. These three stars will be the property of the Anchors this season. However the Rovers have a peculiar way of coming back and it is a safe bet, notwithstanding their loss; that they will come back as strong as ever.

The Stars are fortunate this season in the annexation of Bill Ryan, former "outer-garden" man of the Anchors. Ryan who is one of the best outfielders in the Maritimes will fill a long-felt want on the Easterners' roster, and incidentally that last year's weak spot in the outfield will now be expertly guarded. On the other hand the Stars will need some bolstering up in the infield as Phil McQuaid has left the Province (a good infielder) also a short stop is badly needed. "Anyway we shall see, what we shall see."

On paper the Anchors look the strongest with "Dutchy" Diamond, Francis Cronin, Saunders, Dempsey Diamond, McFarlane, Cameron, Joseph and others to pick from. This team with a good leader will make the others go all summer to stay out in front.

### THE BIG LEAGUES

Apparently the Maritimes are not the only localities hard hit with backward weather. With one day remaining until the familiar tones of the umpire calls "Play ball!" it looks as though the American and National Leagues are going to have a cool opening. This year according to numerous dailies interest in the great diamond pastime is greater than ever and when Commissioner Landis, Ban Johnson, John Heydler and other celebrities of the game start the teams away their time taken up all winter trying to dope out the ultimate winners in both leagues will have their inning come the season gets under way. The situation is complicated in both circuits. Giants are bound to make it interesting from the start in the National, and McGraw is likely to start a vigorous offensive and slow his heels to the other pilots. Pirates with the world's title prestige to give them confidence, are quite a factor to contend with. Bill McKeehan is confident that the Buccaneers will repeat. Chicago Cubs with Joe McCarthy, the minor league managerial sensation at the helm have to be considered, while St. Louis and Brooklyn must also get a look in. Taken all round there should be a spectacular race from bell to bell in the senior league.

### IN THE AMERICAN

The American presents all kinds of possibilities. Again Philadelphia Athletics make the pennant ambitions of Washington Senators. Underated by two distinct reverses in two seasons, Connie Mack is girding his loins and preparing for the season that is bound to make or break the Athletics as championship contenders. He realizes the strength of his club, both at bat and in the field, and the Mackmen are favored in the early season list. Washington is aiming for a third flag, but the task that Bucky Harris has on his shoulders is indeed a tremendous one. John B. Foster, a recognized authority on baseball paints a dismal picture of the Senatorial chances. Even such eminent statistician can err, and Senators, may again surprise them all. Ty Cobb sees a silver lining in the Detroit cloud and Tigers may be the dark horses. At any rate, Senators, Athletics and Tigers are expected to set the pace in Ban Johnson's loop, with any of the other five liable to upset the apple cart about midseason.

### A POPULAR GAME

Anyone who would have ventured to predict five years ago that ladies' basketball would gain a strong foothold in Eastern Canada would have been scoffed at. Nevertheless it is a fact that Toronto Lakesides guaranteed six hundred dollars to the Saint John Trojans to come up for the Maritimes for the Dominion semi-finals. This was a pretty steep sum to kick in with, but when the Canadian basketball officials issued their order for the play-offs it simply had to be done. According to reports it took only a few days for the Lakesides to make up that amount and they played to capacity houses. As they trounced the Maritimers' handily they will meet Edmonton Grads world's champions this week in a series for the Dominion title. The ladies' game is only in its infancy but it demonstrated during the past winter that it has great possibilities.
