Fan Says Blame Him, Not Durocher

NEW YORK, May 1—(AP)—A New York Giant fan said Saturday that it was he and not Leo Durocher who "accidentally kicked and tripped over" Fred Boyesen at the Polo Grounds Thursday afternoon.

George Cronk, 33-year-old railroad fireman, said he had submitted a signed affidavit of the incident to New York Giants. Earlier, the Giants said they had received 100 statements supporting Durocher from persons at the game.

Boyesen, a Brooklyn fan, said that Durocher punched and kicked him after striking him from behind on the playing field after the game.

Durocher denied it. He was suspended from baseball Friday by Commissioner A. B. Chandler pending an investigation.

Cronk said the following was the substance of his statement to the Giants.

"I watched the game from behind the Dodgers' dugout. After the game I went out on the field, following Durocher, the other players and the fans toward the exit.

"Just after I passed second base, Boyesen made a lunge toward Durocher. He apparently must have touched Lippy, because I saw the manager swing his left elbow around and touch the man. But Lippy didn't look back. Boyesen lost his balance and fell.

"I was so close behind him, I couldn't help myself. I tripped over him. I suppose I kicked him in the leg or some other place in so doing and then stepped over him.

"I apologized, I said 'sorry' and walked out of the park."

Giant president Horace Stoneham said he would back Durocher all the way when the suspended manager goes on Chandler's carpet in Cincinnati Tuesday.

BRANDON, Man., May 1—(CP)—Inspired by Ray Frederick's brilliant goaltending and forward Jack McKenzie's two-goal effort, Brandon Wheat Kings Saturday night evened their best-of-seven Memorial Cup final with the Montreal Royals at one game apiece as they downed the Quebec squad 3-2.

Royals won the opening contest at Winnipeg last Thursday. Third game will be played here Tuesday night.

More than 4,700 fans saw Wheat Kings and Royals battle on even terms for two periods before McKenzie broke up the game midway in the last period. Montreal threw the works at the Manitobans to great heights to keep the Easterners at bay. Spectacular tagging by Angus Jukes, shifty Wheatie forward, also was instrumental in their victory.

In breaking Royals' 14-game winning streak, Brandon maintained their season record of not being beaten in two successive games.

Frank King, Brandon captain, was credited with his team's other tally, when Vic Piles, Royal defenceman shoved the puck into his own net while attempting to clear during a Wheat King assault.

Matt Benoit and Roland Rousseau were Montreal's marksmen, but as in the first contest, it was slim Bobby Bleau in goal who held the spotlight for the visitors.

Senators Score 3-1 Victory Over Regina To Lead Series 2-0

OTTAWA, May 1—(CP)—Ottawa Senators scored a 3-1 victory over Regina Capitals Saturday night to take a commanding two-game lead in the best-of-seven series for the Allan Cup.

A crowd of 8,039 saw the Senators—powered by their high-scoring line of Nils Tremblay, Ed Dartnell and Bill Robinson—fight the Caps on even terms for two periods and then put the game away with two quick goals in the final session.

Third game of the finals for the Canadian senior hockey championship is scheduled for Monday night.

With only three penalties apiece, Saturday night's game was a lot tamer than the hard-hitting first meeting last Thursday which Senators won 6-4.

Regina had an edge in play during the first period, but it was Senators who made chances count, taking a 1-0 lead when Tremblay, 24-year-old centre from Quebec City, used a Regina rearguard as a screen to beat goalie Bev Bentley with a waist-high shot to the short corner.

Regina outshot the Senators 8-7 in that period, but Senators had the shooting edge from then on—16-9 in the middle frame and 10-5 in the final period. In all Bentley had 33 stops to make while Bill (Legs) Fraser, veteran Ottawa goaltender, was tested 22 times.

The second period was scoreless and play was slow.

At 1:16 of the final period, Caps got back in the game when Ab McDougall, right-winger from Medicine Hat, Alta., picked up the rebound, and rammed the puck into the open corner to make it 1-1.

Senators were back in the lead about five minutes later, however, on a surprise goal from taceoff in the Regina corner. Tremblay flipped the puck back to Robinson who golfed it from about 25 feet out to beat Bentley without leaving the ice. The shot was screened by a tangle of players.

Buddy Hellyer, Montreal-born right-winger, sewed it up three minutes later when he slipped the puck smoothly into the corner after Lude Check perfectly relayed a pass from Emile Dagenals.

Boston Braves, who won the pennant in the National League last year, are up in first place today after sweeping a Sunday doubleheader from New York Giants 6-5 and 4-2.

Cincinnati Reds, leaders until Sunday, dropped back when they split with Pittsburgh. The Pirates won the opener 10-4 and the Reds the rain-marred nightcap 5-2.

Johnny Antonelli, 19-year-old, \$60,000-bonus southpaw, made his first major-league start for Boston in the nightcap against the Giants and it was an overwhelming success. Although relieved by Neils Potter in the ninth, he held the Giants to one run in eight innings.

Philadelphia Phillies made it three straight over Brooklyn Dodgers Sunday as Russ Meyer pitched the hustling Phils to a 4-2 victory.

Del Ennis and Andy Semnick homered for the Phils and Duke Snider for the Dodgers.

The Phillies got all their runs in Freacher Roe's seven-inning stint. They scored twice in the first on a double by Richie Ashburn and singles by Ed Waitkus and Ennis. Homers by Semnick in the fourth and Ennis in the fifth gave them a 4-0 lead.

The Dodgers cut that lead in the sixth when Gene Hermanski singled and Snider homered.

Harry (The Cat) Brecheen scattered 13 hits to coast in behind a 15-hit attack by St. Louis Cardinals to defeat Chicago Cubs 8-3.

It was drizzling throughout most of the contest in which the Cardinals got away to a four-run lead by routing Dutch Leonard in the second inning.

Stan Mustal led the hitting attack on five Cub hurlers, collecting three for three. The victory gave the Cardinals the series two games to one.

WINNIPEG, May 1—(CP)—If Syl Apps is interested, and if Toronto Maple Leafs have no objections, there's a three-year job with Montreal Canadiens awaiting the former National Hockey League star, at \$10,000 a year.

Frank Selke, general manager of the Montreal Forum, said in an interview here Friday that "if I could get Syl Apps' contract I'd sign him right now for three years at \$10,000 a season, and that's more than Toronto ever gave him."

Selke described Apps as "one of the greatest competitors the game ever had."
