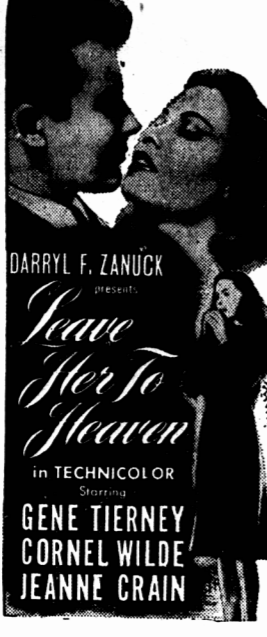

Annual Report of Credit Union Given

The following is the annual report of the president of St. Paul's Credit Union, Summerside, Mr. Cyrus Fortier, which was delivered at the annual meeting of the credit union which was held in St. Paul's Hall on Tuesday evening.

Fellow members of the St. Paul's Credit Union: On behalf of the Board of Directors I herewith bring you a short resume of the activities of your Credit Union since its re-organization ten months ago. It is not my intention in this report to quote you figures. The report of the treasurer and of the Credit Committee will give you all the details of the financial standing of your Credit Union but I want to bring to your attention some of the developments which have taken place in your Credit Union and some of the social benefits which have come to its members.

Our progress may not be as great as we would like to see it but when you will have heard the whole story of what has been done in the ten months that we have been in operation, I believe, and I think you will agree with me, that we have made great strides towards achieving the goal for which we are organized, namely a more abundant life for the community. We have now in our Credit Union 173 members. These members have benefited through their Credit Union in many ways, some of which I will make mention of briefly. Through the savings that they have made themselves, much of which would never have been made if it had not been for the Credit Union. They have been pooling their savings made available to each member a source of credit which to many would otherwise have been impossible. Secondly, they have benefited which has come to the members is the Savings and Loan Insurance which we have taken with Cuna. Cuna is an organization of Credit Unions for the purpose of insurance will be explained to you later by some of the speakers. Your Credit Union has benefited its members by making loans to suit the borrower, with no red tape attached. These loans were made from the joint savings of the members including the savings of the borrowers themselves.

One of the main functions of the Credit Union is thrift, educating its members to save regularly by making small weekly or monthly deposits. A Credit Union inspires faith in a new cooperative mind almost overnight, for as soon as the new member has made his first deposit and received his pass book he feels the same as if he had made a deposit in a bank. The Credit Union develops the spirit of cooperation in its members. They are eager to pass on the idea to some one else.

I want to bring to your attention the splendid work which was done by your Board of Directors and by the different committees which were appointed at the organization. The speaker described the situation that prevails today when annually, thousands of pupils are catapulted upon the labor market, many at grade 9 and 10 level. Of those who matriculate less than five per cent will go on to college and thus have no chance to make their own way. The remainder face the problem of choosing a vocation. Looking back over the school years they may well ask what help has been given them to make this critical choice.

Mr. Mercer said that teachers and school authorities are not to blame for the faults of the system of which they are well aware but powerless to correct. Public opinion, he said, must be moulded and crystallized and brought up to date. The speaker then went on to describe at length how a system of educational guidance in a school is conducted and what the students are taught.

In conclusion he said "Education is big business and we run it like a 'jot 'em down store.' Time was when teachers kept school and needed only a bell, a few brown-beaten pupils and no equipment. In this big business we need equipment, better methods and better paid teachers. We should throw off the conventions of the past and use a little common sense."

The president, Mr. J. E. Dalton, presided, and the guests were Rotarian Arthur MacPherson, Charlottetown; George Dalton, Winnipeg, and J. J. Emma, Summerside.

Boost System Of Social Services

EDMONTON, Oct. 16 (CP)—Alberta is a leader among the provinces in advanced social services to protect the health of its residents. After-care for victims of poliomyelitis and maternity hospital care are provided without charge as well as cancer diagnosis and surgery and treatment for tuberculosis and venereal disease. A municipal hospital plan sponsored by the government is expanding rapidly.

Alberta is the only province in Canada providing complete after-care of polio victims free of charge in special hospitals until maximum recovery is obtained. The province also provides a rehabilitation plan to train recovered patients to handle self-sustaining jobs. Dr. A. Somerville, the province's director of the division of communicable diseases, said expert poliomyelitis care began in 1938 in Alberta is a logical thing, but most victims cannot afford the expensive treatment. He commented that there is no doubt the total amount of hand-lap has been reduced for many Albertans through this "early and adequate treatment."

In the field of cancer Alberta's Social Credit government established diagnostic clinics in 1940, added x-ray and radium treatments in 1942 and surgery in 1942 to make free cancer treatment in this province the most advanced in Canada. The province does not pay hospital bills for persons if they are sent to hospital while diagnosis is under way.

To Resume Production

WINDSOR, Ont., Oct. 16 (CP)—The Brunner Mond of Canada plant at nearby Amherstburg will resume full production of soda ash—vital to production for manufacture of glass, textiles and other goods—next Sunday or Monday, Manager R. G. Zimmer announced today.

He said some 150 maintenance men now are in the plant preparing for resumption of operations after the wages-hours strike which began July 5 and ended last Thursday. The strike, called by the United Automobile Workers (C.I.O.), involved some 400 workers.
