A most deplorable accident happened on Friday evening to Grace, the thirteen year old daughter of Mrs. Wm. Vickerson, of North River. The little one had in some way got hold of a flask of powder and was trying to explode some of it upon the top of the kitchen stove. The fire being low and not igniting the powder quickly, the child removed one of the stovetids and dropped some powder from the flask upon the embers in the stove. Immediately there was an explosion. The stove lids were forced upwards and the flask was blown apart in the child's hand, tearing the forefinger almost off. Dr. Ledwell of this city was called to the case and he put back the finger, but it is difficult to say whether it can be saved or not. Besides the injury to her hand the little one was very badly burned about the face. Yesterday her condition was as hopeful as could be looked for in the circumstances.

On Tuesday January 30th Mrs. Marjory Stewart, relict of the late Joseph Stewart of Brackley Point Road, passed peacefully away at the very ripe age of 91 years. The deceased was a daughter of the late Peter Stewart of Marshfield, having been born on the Tulloch Farm where the Hon. Senator Ferguson now resides. Seventy-three years ago she married, and, with her husband, was numbered among the first settlers on the Brackley Point Road. There she and her husband shared the joys and sorrows of life for sixty-three years—developing a valuable and comfortable homestead—and now, surviving her husband in the comfort of that same for a period of ten years, her death removes the last of the earliest settlers in the whole district lying between the shore road on the north and the city.
