After all, the advantage America enjoys of being able to offer the best—both the best orchestras and the best soloists—is too great to need further comment."

### FIRST FLIGHT FROM SPITZBERGEN TO ALASKA OVER NORTH POLE

Completed by Dirigible Norge Which Arrived at Teller, Alaska, at 2 a.m. Saturday, Eastern Standard Time—Crew Were All Well After Their Thrilling Experience.

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 15.—Completing the first flight from Spitzbergen to Alaska over the North Pole, Capt. Roald Amundsen's dirigible Norge arrived at Teller, Alaska, at 2 a.m. today, eastern standard time.

### Amundsen Leader

Amundsen was leader of the Arctic flight, Ellsworth second in command, Omdahl and Wisting especially charged with landing the Norge. The remaining fourteen men comprising the crew were left at Teller with the dirigible which is now being deflated. It is to be made ready for shipment by steamer to the United States.
