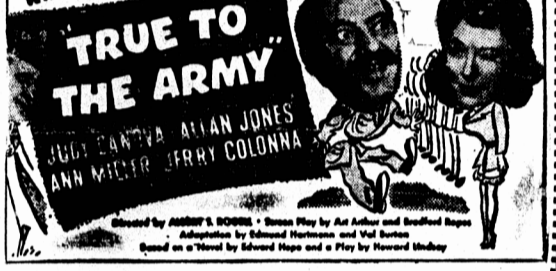

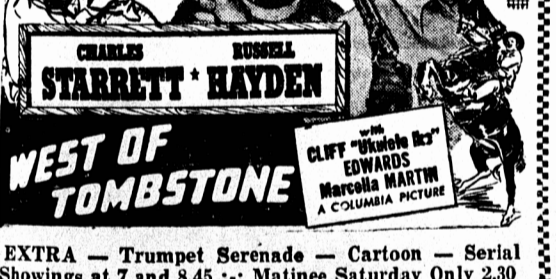

Retail Price Ceiling For Island Eggs

Accordingly the retail prices in Charlottetown should be Grade A large 59; Grade A medium 57; Grade A pullet 54; Grade B 51 and Grade C 49.

The order also provides that other grades or sub-grades are to be sold at wholesale prices bearing proper relationship to those set out above.

A charge of two cents a dozen above the maximum wholesale price for the particular grade may be added to the foregoing prices when eggs are packed in cartons containing a dozen or half-dozen eggs.

Any seller of "quality" eggs may continue to sell at the premium he obtained in the basic period, but this is not to exceed four cents per dozen above the price for Grade A large. Quality premium eggs are defined as those marked to indicate their special quality as to weight and age which qualifies them for the premium in accordance with the recognized standard for Grade A1 eggs.
