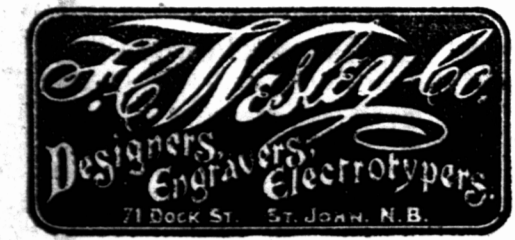

HAS A GRIM HUMOR.

Wasting Fertilizer on Onions.

Potato growers frequently use a ton of high grade fertilizer per acre, which would contain an amount of plant food far in excess of the needs of the largest crop it would be possible to grow. Such fertilizing is so wasteful, and the Geneva (N.Y.) station says tests proved it so and that the onion grower runs great risk of diminished profits when he uses 1,500 to 2,000 pounds of commercial manure per acre.
