THE people of Summerside will be highly pleased to learn that the Caledonia Club of P. E. I. at their regular meeting in Charlottetown last night decided to hold their annual Scottish Gathering in Summerside on July 20 next. This completes the programme for the Islanders' Reunion, being arranged by the Tourist Association and will be gratifying news. The Executive of the Association will in a few days decide upon a detailed programme for publication for which the public will no doubt await with interest.

The nuptials take place this evening at 7.30 o'clock at the home of the bride's parents, Wm. and Mrs. Hodgson, Malpeque, of their daughter, Miss Catherine Annie, to William Thompson, Darnley. The bride will be attended by Miss Fannie McNutt, Malpeque, and the groom will be supported by Montgomery Owen, teacher in Darnley school. The ceremony will be performed by Rev. E. J. Rattee, while a large number of guests will be present. A long list of wedding gifts testify to the popularity of the happy couple. The Guardian extends congratulations.

One of the oldest landmarks of Kelvin was removed on Saturday March 19th in the person of John Glover whose death occurred after an illness of only four days. Up to that time he had been in his usual health and retained all his faculties to the last. He was born May 14th, 1815 in Annandale, Scotland and immigrated to P. E. I. with his parents in 1819 in a vessel named "Jessie" which landed at Green's shore now Summerside. There was only a fish house there at the time. They settled in Traveller's Rest. In 1839 he was married to Margaret Marchbank of New Annan and moved six miles back in the green woods. There was no road except a timber trail and he had to cut down some trees in order to clear a space to build a house on. He leaves to mourn a sorrowing widow and eleven children, three of whom have pre-deceased him. The others are James of Kelvin, David and Anthony of Brockton, Mass., Mrs. C. Mason and Miss Mary of Bridgewater Mass., Mrs. Geo. Bowness of Kensington, and Miss Janie and John at home. The funeral which was one of the grandest ever seen in that community was conducted by Rev. John Murray of Clifton. It was a custom in Scotland when a person took a Bible to read a chapter to just read the one where the book opened, so the morning after he and his wife landed at their new home he sat down to read and his Bible opened at the ninety-first psalm which he read. Mr. Murray first read so that it was the first and last chapter read in the home while he was there. The minister dwelt very largely on the 10th verse which is "With long life will I satisfy him and show him my salvation." He was an esteemed man, kind and hospitable and will be greatly missed where he was known and loved by all. His remains were laid to rest in the Kensington Cemetery. The pall bearers were viz: William Hogg, John Walker, Freetown; David Walker, New Annan; John Stavert, Robert McMurdo and Samuel Woodside, Clifton. (Summerside Journal please copy.)
