

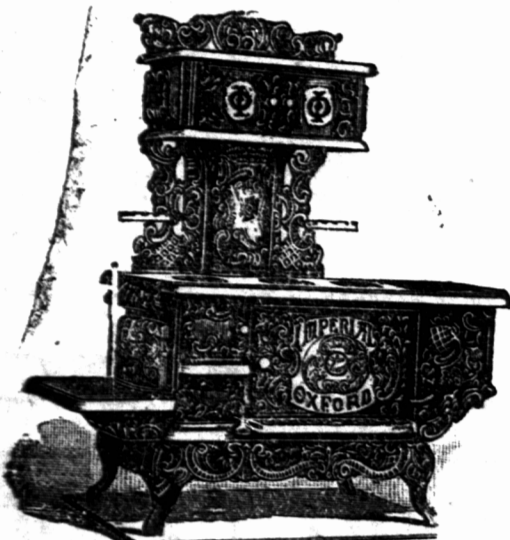

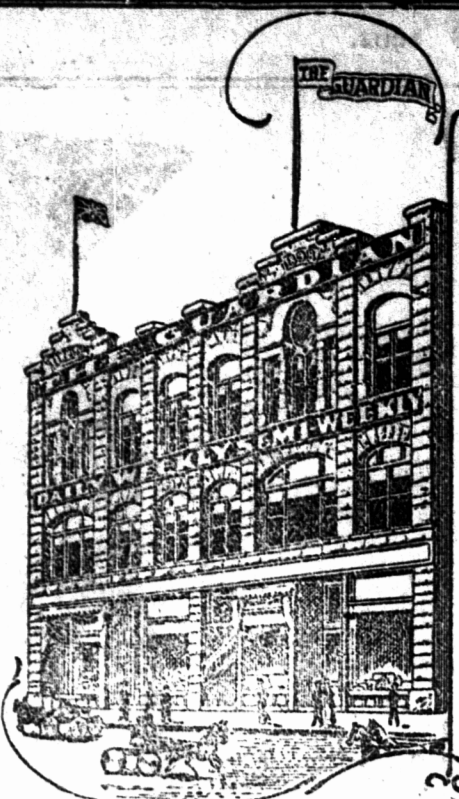

GERMANY AS A COLONIZER

Germans seem anxious to extend their colonial possessions. At the recent colonial congress in Berlin a delegate made the curious proposal that Germany should join Britain and the United States in securing colonies and in developing and protecting overseas trade.

The suggestion is not likely to meet with favor in either of the latter nations. Great Britain possesses already a very respectable portion of the earth's surface, and as for the United States it is doubtful whether the arduous task of "colonizing" the Philippines will develop a very hearty appetite for more land.

Germany, so far, has not made a brilliant success of colonizing. She possesses, it is true, overseas territory five times the area of the fatherland. These lands lie in Africa, Asia and Oceania, but contain in the aggregate only 4068 German residents. This is a poor showing when it is considered that in 1901 alone nearly 20,000 Germans emigrated from the fatherland to the United States, and that Canada and Australia to-day boast respectively 335,000 and 106,000 German citizens. No wonder that Germany wants outside aid in her work of colonization.—Toronto World.

THE BOOK DELUGE.

To say that the world is flooded with books is to give utterance to a truism, and to say also that the flood is fast changing to a torrent is to say what is obvious to those who follow the announcements of fall books and who have brains large enough to digest the mass of reviews and gossip about books and book writers that now fills the journals and magazines. An Exchange Says that there never seems to be danger of having too many musical composers or painters of pictures, but the world certainly is threatened with too many writers of books.

And not one of these volumes is destined to live beyond the hour, says the literary pessimist, who silences one's doubt over the fact with the demand: "Where are the books of yesterday and where the popular novel that last Christmas was among the Christmas gift of every up-to-date literary personage?" It must be confessed that we don't know where they are, and what is more, we don't much care, though this does not dampen our ardor for the new holiday books. No doubt a literary famine would be less disastrous than a coal famine and perhaps the day may come when intellectual starvation of this kind may set in, but, in the meantime, it is well to enjoy the literary feast and to admit, if possible, that a few of the dishes will nourish the brain as well as tickle the palate.

Commercial Intelligence says that Clyde shipbuilding was exceedingly brisk during September, the output having been only once exceeded in the same month during the last dozen years. Two warships, nineteen steamers and three sailers were launched, aggregating over 54,000 tons. The new work placed exceeds 57,000 tons, including a first-class battleship, two steamers of 10,000 tons each for the Aberdeen Line, two steamers for English railway companies, two Clan liners, and an Indian trader.
