Franco-British Naval Agreement

(Canadian Press)
PARIS, July 31.—The most important clause of the Franco-British naval agreement signed on Saturday is understood to be concerned with the question of 10,000 ton cruisers. The precise nature of the agreement is being withheld here because it was agreed between the British and French governments that Washington should first be informed.

A note giving the full contents of the agreement went forward to the French charge d'affaires at Washington last night and presumably will be transmitted to the states department today. The other signatories to the Washington naval agreement, Italy and Japan, also will be informed.

Sir Austen's announcement in the House of Commons yesterday was a complete surprise to the French foreign office as the agreement was only closed Saturday in London and the French had assumed that all the great naval powers would be informed before the announcement was made.

The Provincial Rifle Matches were completed yesterday afternoon at 6 o'clock, and were certainly very successfully and very capably managed by the secretary, Lt.-Col. Charles Leigh, V.D., and the range officer, Capt. W. H. Wortli.

During the afternoon Col. F. S. Moore, V.D., honorary president of the Association and Col. H. M. Davidson, V.D., president of the Association, visited the ranges and all were delighted to see them because of their great and continued interest in rifle practice.

Four matches were completed as follows: The Silver Black Fox Match, ten points at 300 yards, possible 50 points was won by Eric Coles, with a score of 49. R. L. Coles 2nd, with 48.

By the way the Coles boys did some wonderful shooting throughout the meet.

The Corporation match was the second consisted of ten rounds at 500 yards, and was won by Sgt. J. Landrigan with a score of 49, with J. E. Andrew and G. R. Judson runners up, with 48.

In connection with this match it may be mentioned that Cadet R. McCabe, 15 year old son of Lt. Allan McCabe, was seventh with a score of 47 points.

At the conclusion of the corporation match figures were given out for the winners of the Gov. General's medals. Sgt. J. E. Andrew, son of J. B. Andrew, East Royalty, won the Gov. General's Silver Medal, with a score of 293 points. Capt. A. W. Allan and R. L. Coles tied for the Bronze Medal with a score of 292.

The final shoot of the day was the Ladies Challenge Trophy Match where 36 riflemen shot for 36 ladies the names being drawn by Miss Berna Huie.

Four riflemen tied for first place, namely, A. J. McCabe, Edison Smith, James Coles, J. E. Andrew. In the shoot off Lt. A. J. McCabe was the winner, and the trophy will be in the custody of Mrs. A. A. Bartlett for one year.

At the conclusion of the Ladies Challenge Match the Ottawa aggregate was posted, showing that Sgt. J. E. Andrew had won the Dominion Canada Rifle Association Silver medal with a score of 337.

At the conclusion of the shoot, Col. H. M. Davidson presented the Davison Challenge trophy for the highest aggregate in the entire two days shooting to Sgt. J. E. Andrew. Many admiring eyes were cast on this beautiful piece of silverware, and there is no doubt that it will prove an incentive to the future.

Prince Edward Island should this year have a strong team for the Dominion of Canada Rifle Matches at Ottawa, and it is hoped that the top notchers of the meeting will be able to make every effort to go and worthily represent this province.

The statistical part of the meeting was capably handled by Col. Leigh's assistant, Mr. Stewart Moore and staff.
