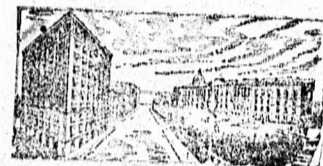

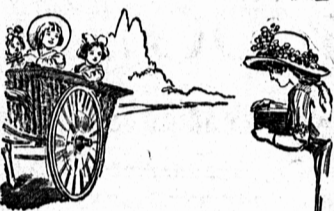

ICE-CREAM SOCIAL.—On Wednesday evening, July 16th, on the parsonage grounds at Cornwall the W. M. S. workers held an ice-cream social in aid of their great work. The weather was favorable, a large company gathered and the funds of the society benefitted considerably.

CORNWALL SERVICES.—At Cornwall Methodist Church, Sunday evening, July 27th, the Rev. Edmund Ackland will conduct the service and preach. He, with his wife and children, are visiting their old home and friends. Doubtless many will be glad to have the opportunity of hearing him.

A SLIGHT ACCIDENT.—In avoiding a prancing horse on the North River Road on Wednesday night a motor car ran into a telephone pole at the side of the road. The pole was knocked down, while one of the lamps of the car was smashed. The car not being otherwise injured, the party in it were able to resume their drive.

A HORSE INJURED.—One of the horses of Mr. W. F. Robbins' livery stables met with an accident yesterday. While being driven along Great Street, a motor car went past it, and the horse reared up and coming down heavily, brought the hoof of its right forefoot down upon the fetlock of the left forefoot, causing a fracture to the bone. The animal was promptly attended to by Dr. Leckie, the Vet., and there is hope of the bone mending. The extraordinary part about the affair is that the horse had on several occasions previously been met and passed by motor cars, and had not once been in the slightest manner affected by them.

RECOVERY OF A BODY.—As briefly stated in yesterday's Guardian, the greatly decomposed body of a male person was discovered ashore at Crown Point on Thursday by Mr. Locke Jones, whose farm is situated at that place, which is ten miles from the city. The body was removed to the city by Mr. Hennessey, undertaker, and it was subsequently identified as the remains of Capt. Henri Cormier, of this city, who, with the other members of the crew, was drowned on the 10th of June last off Point Prim when the schooner Polar Star, bound to Charlottetown from Pictou with coal, went down with all hands in a gale. Where the body was washed ashore was 15 miles from the spot the schooner went down. The identity was established by means of the clothing that still remained on portions of the body, and by the fact that the thumb of the left hand was missing, as was the case with Capt. Cormier, also by the general appearance of the body tallying with his description; the identity of the clothes being affirmed by the deceased captain's wife, and the general identification of the body by his brother-in-law. The coroner did not deem it necessary to hold an inquest on the body, the cause of death being known, and in the course of yesterday afternoon the corpse was interred, the Rev. Father McQuaid officiating at the graveside. The funeral took place from Mr. Hennessey's undertaking establishment. It is peculiar that the boots that the deceased was wearing at the time of his death were found in a remarkable state of preservation, in spite of the fact that they had been in the water for nearly six weeks. The pockets of the clothing on the body were searched for papers that would prove identification, but all that was found in them was a pipe, filled with seaweed and sand.

FOR THE CLIFF HOTEL.—On Monday morning a number of the Charlottetown automobiles will drive to the Cliff Hotel, Stanhope, leaving the city shortly before luncheon. As this is the first motoring on this road the owners are anxious that the people should have ample notification to enable them to take their horses on the road in order to make them acquainted with the autos or to avoid them as their inclinations prompt them.

FOR SUMMER SCHOOL.—Fredrick E. Smith, Principal of the Chester College, Chester, Mass., arrived in Charlottetown on Tuesday, July 22nd. Mr. Smith is one of the instructors who has been engaged for work in connection with the Teachers Summer School, to be held in Charlottetown, July 28th, to August 9th. Mr. Smith has had a long acquaintance with Nature Study working schools and will give a good account of himself during the course.

GOES TO RESCUE.—The C. G. S. Earl Grey has gone to the assistance of the steamer Boethic, stranded off the reef at Rich Point. The Boethic which is loaded with government supplies for Port Nelson and Hudson Bay points, is reported to be comparatively uninjured and as soon as her cargo can be lightened it is expected she can be released. In the event of the vessel being then unable to proceed to Hudson Bay another vessel will be chartered by the government to finish the voyage.
