**Pierrie Casgrain Salated For Speakership?**

OTTAWA, Dec. 12.—Prominently mentioned as likely to be the next speaker of the House of Commons, Pierrie Casgrain, chief Liberal whip and member for Charlevoix-Saguenay, was in Ottawa today. Mr. Casgrain said he was here on private business.

The Commons Speaker technically is the choice of the House so that the appointment will not be made until the next day Parliament opens. Nomination of the presiding officer will be moved by Prime Minister King.

Selection of Mr. Casgrain would follow the practice of alternating between a French and English speaker in successive Parliaments. Hon. George Black, succeeded by Hon. J. L. Bowman, were Speakers in the last Parliament.

**Back Empire Settlement Scheme**

LONDON, Dec. 18.—The National Government tonight accepted a private member's proposal of an Empire settlement board to stimulate migration within the Empire, after a spirited debate in which Arthur Beverley Baxter, Toronto-born Conservative, urged migration to Canada, and Labor members declared new settlers are not welcome in the Dominions.

Douglas Hackins, Under-secretary for the Dominions, said the government would adopt the idea put forward by Capt. J. R. J. MacNamara, Conservative.

Incoming trains from Upper Canadian cities will be bringing their allotment of students attending universities and colleges in Montreal, Toronto and elsewhere, the first of which should arrive tomorrow.

**THIRD MARRIAGE OF NEW YORK HEIRESS**

NEW YORK, Dec. 19.—Mrs. Marjorie Post Close Hutton, who has more millions than she has husbands, was married yesterday to Joseph E. Davies, Washington, D. C. attorney.

Musicians and servants at Mrs. Davies' 62-room apartment, outnumbered the guests, who were kept down to a select 100. The latter included Attorney-General Homer S. Cummings, Stephen T. Early, assistant secretary to President Roosevelt; Senator James J. Davis of Pennsylvania and Mrs. Davis, Senator Millard E. Tydings of Maryland; Jesse H. Jones, chairman of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation; and Joseph Tumulty, former secretary to the late President Wilson.

Mrs. Davies is one of the richest women in the United States, so she did not hesitate to lay a red plush carpet across the sidewalk even if it was a rainy day. One member of her staff was delegated to keep wrinkles out of the carpet so none of the guests would stumble.

The progress of the wedding was reported to newspapermen and photographers by a short, dark man who thrust his head out iron-grill doors at intervals and shouted brief bulletins.

"Now they're walking down the aisle," he shouted, and disappeared for five minutes.

"Now they're getting married."

There was a brief pause and he appeared again.

"It's all over and he kissed her twice. Once on each cheek."

Mrs. Davies inherited much of the Post Cereal fortune, and this is her third marriage. Davies formerly was chairman of the Federal Trade Commission.

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**Roosevelt Studies Budget**

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire)  
WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—President Roosevelt and his advisers concentrated intently today upon the shaping of a 1937 budget intended to slow down the climb of a public debt already past the \$30,000,000,000 mark.

On the crest of the month's huge borrowing program, the debt rose today to \$30,555,791,967, the highest point it has ever attained and a figure not far short of the total pre-

dicted by the President for the end of the present fiscal year, next June 30.

With less than three weeks remaining for the completion of the budget, Mr. Roosevelt and his helpers concentrated upon bringing expenditures and receipts closer together next year and thereby preventing increases in the debt similar to those of recent years. Adding item to item, including a reduced allocation for the civilian conservation corps, they still left a blank for the most important figure of all—that for relief of the unemployed.

**Bad For Discipline**

LONDON, Ont., Dec. 18.—London's Board of Education decided today that its young women school teachers should not be commended for teaching older boy students the art of ballroom dancing.

Teachers who spend much of their spare time teaching boys in their classes how to dance could scarcely expect to maintain discipline in the classroom, in the opinion of C. C. Carrothers, retiring Chairman of the board. It was his speech which killed a motion commending teachers for their dancing instruction.

Chairman Carrothers said he was unalterably in disfavor of teachers giving lessons in ballroom dancing. "It certainly can't help discipline," he said.

Trustee Joseph Jeffery, who had asked the teachers be commended for their extra curricular activity, said he wouldn't use the word "ballroom."

"All right, then," came back the Chairman. "I'll say waltzes, figure trots, the tango, Yes, and the rhumba."
