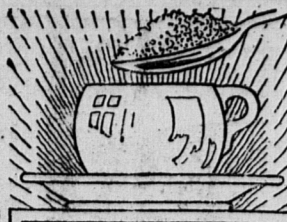

No Flu Within The Maritime Provinces

OTTAWA, Feb. 5.—Reports from every province of Canada indicate that there is as yet no widespread epidemic of influenza. The federal department of health, which has been keeping in close touch with the situation for the past month, states that where cases have developed they are of a comparatively mild type, with few complications. The eastern provinces of Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick report no influenza within their boundaries. All of the eastern section of Quebec is also free, but ninety-two cases have been reported in the city of Montreal.

In Ontario several centres are affected the disease spreading east from the city of Windsor and supposedly coming from the neighborhood of Chicago. The type is mild in character. Manitoba has a few cases in various parts of the province, few of which have developed into pneumonia. Saskatchewan reports three deaths and a few cases in widely separated localities. Some of these cases have been traced directly to the United States. Alberta has some scattered cases of a mild type. Extensive preparations for combatting the disease have been made.

Many Killed by Indians

PANAMA, Feb. 4.—San Blas Indians made a sudden attack on Panama police and residents of a rubber gathering settlement at Port Belter, about eighty miles to the east of Colon, killed seventeen persons and wounded many others, according to advice received here. The Panama government is fitting out an expedition to sail from Colon to restore order.

By their work, barriers have been broken down and in every land there is an eager call for more missions, more teachers, more doctors, more hospitals. Now, owing to the declining value of the dollar, it is necessary to double the expenditure in order even to hold the ground won. Until that is done, an advanced Missionary programme can not be undertaken.

Mass Movements in India India is our brother-land, a loyal British dependency. Illiteracy is the rule. Caste imprisons the people and stifles all ambition. British administration has taught the folk the value of peace. English-speaking Missionaries from Canada are teaching them the value of education and the power of the Name which is above every name. Great masses of the people are asking for baptism, but there are not enough Missionaries to teach them.

A Mandate for Expansion

All men, who think honestly realize that the Gospel of Christ is unique in moral splendor, in spiritual force, in civilizing influence. It redeems the individual and exalts the nation. It has made the modern world of thought, of industry, of progress. It must go out over all the earth to ease international relationships, to put an end to cruelty and misery. There is free entry for the Gospel in every nation under Heaven. Lift up your heads, O ye Gates of India, and be ye lifted up, ye everlasting Doors of China and Japan and Africa, and the King of Glory shall come in.
