\$15,000 seats For the Millennium

(By British United Press) LONDON, July 26.-"I was advised that, for \$15,000, I could have reserved a seat in the temple from which I should be able to see the second coming of Christ, across the waters of Sydney Harbour."

The woman who made this extraordinary statement arrived in London recently from Sydney, New South Wales, and her remark referred to the "temple" which had been built on the shores of Sydney Harbour by a religious sect known as the Order of the Star in the East.

This sect, which is said to have a world-wide membership of one hundred thousand, is controlled in Australia by a man calling himself "Bishop" Leadbeater. It appeals with the promise of the approaching second advent of Christ, and, under the auspices of Leadbeater, it had set to work in Sydney on practical business lines.

Money, subscribed mainly by hysterical women, has so swollen the older's local fund that an old house on the north shore of the harbour has been bought, considerably enlarged and converted into a "temple."

It is apparently proclaimed by Leadbeater that Christ will appear walking over the water through the Heads-as the Passage into the Pacific Ocean is called-of Sydney Harbour. The house which he has acquired faces the Heads, and below it he has had constructed a vast amphitheatre in the classical style.

Each seat in this amphitheatre-to put the idea in the simplest language-will command an excellent view of the second advent, and each seat may be reserved by members of the order for sums proportionate to their means.

"WHERE'S YOUR PIPE?" BALDWIN ASKED; WAVED IT IN REPLY.

TORONTO, -On Board Empress of Australia, July 27. (By Wireless to the Canadian Press.)-To the intense delight of the passengers board the Empress of Australia and the throngs ashore watching the ship departing from Southampton for Canada with the Prince of Wales, Prince George, Premier Baldwin and Mrs. Baldwin, and party aboard, the two Princes and the Premier appeared on the bridge just as the ship's siren sounded the final note prior to leaving the dock.

The Prince of Wales had changed from a light grey suit to a brown suit and was wearing a cap. He merrily waved his greetings to those on the dock, and as the great vessel sheered off the crowd which had previously lustily cheered the royal passengers and the Prime Minister renewed the cheers enthusiastically. Other ocean liners in Southampton waters delivered blasts of farewell greetings to the smiling trio on the bridge with the commander of the ship.

With the exception of being received by the Mayor of Southampton, P. V. Boyer, the arrival of the two Princes and Premier at the Southampton dockside station was marked by the slightest ceremony. An eager crowd, which kept at a respectful distance, broke into hearty cheering as the Princes marched from the dockside station to the ship.

Whilst acknowledging the greeting the Prince of Wales hurried to the deck and rapidly took the elevator up to his own apartments. In fact many of the passengers on board the Empress of Australia were unaware of his arrival and he did not appear again until the vessel sailed.

Premier Baldwin also was heartily cheered. He smilingly waved his hand to the crowd. Mrs. Baldwin also came in for friendly cheers and she was obviously grateful for the reception.

An amusing incident occurred when somebody in the crowd ashore shouted to the Premier, "Where's your pipe?" Mr. Baldwin smilingly waved his hand, in which he was holding his famous briar.

HURLED CROCKERYWARE AT THE CAMERA MAN

Mrs. J. A. Stillman, Mother of "Bud" Made Vigorous Protest against unwanted attentions of Moving Picture Operators, During the wedding of her son

MONTREAL, July 27.-A vigorous protest by Mrs. James A. Stillman, mother of "Bud," against the unwanted attentions of over-enthusiastic moving-picture operators was a lively incident in the wedding celebrations at Grande Anse yesterday, when Bud was united to Miss Lena Wilson, daughter of the Canadian backwoods. The ceremony, which took place in a picturesque outdoor setting, was performed by Rev. Abbe Lamy of Grandes Piles, assisted by Rev. Father Normand and Father Desilets, of Three Rivers. It took place at 4 o'clock daylight time yesterday afternoon.

According to a special correspondent of the Montreal Gazette, the incident took place shortly after the marriage when Lena had just begun to cut the wedding-cake. Mrs. J. A. Stillman objected vehemently to the group of moving picture men who were clicking their cameras for the benefit of the world.

"This is for my friends, not for photographers," Mrs. Stillman is quoted as saying, as she rushed on one of the movie-men. The Gazette says:

"Suddenly Mrs. Stillman saw a crockery and crystal-laden table. 'Out you get out of here,' came the shrill orders and as she shouted she laid down a barrage of plates and dishes on the unlucky trio, one of whom, Bert Mason of Montreal, got a plate on the side of his head. The lighter of the 300 guests who were standing on the lawn, preparing to dance to the music of the band of the Royal Highlanders of Canada, here from Montreal, and the special merriment of 'Bud' and Lena, the cameramen fled—all of them."

The incident served only to inject considerable merriment into the post-nuptial celebrations and did not in any way disturb the general enjoyment of the proceedings.

On the wide sward, with its setting of pines, in which the Stillman summer camp is situated a temporary altar had been erected and by four o'clock, bush-workers, villagers and colonists from their outlying farms, were mingling with hundreds of guests whose formal attire presented a striking contrast to the home-spun of the northern settlers. Newspapemen, banded yesterday from the camp were permitted to be present. The throng gathered on the lawn and first appeared Father Lamy, accompanied by Fathers Normand and Desilets. Then came the bride, sweetly attractive in her immaculate wedding-gown, then the bridegroom and all the relatives of the two parties.

With due solemnity the ceremony went forward in accordance with the formalities of the Roman Catholic Church. Prayers in English were intoned by Father Normand. The marriage over, the register was signed and the Kilties, posted under a clump of trees, played again as appropriately as they had played the bridal chorus from Lohengrin a short while before. The whole ceremony was deeply impressive and the peace that enshrouded the whole countryside settled over the immense throng.

The celebrations that followed were entered into with true French-Canadian éclat, the crockery bombardment of the luckless movie-men being accepted as a ludicrous interlude in a thoroughly gay occasion.

\$291,000 Paid for Winner of Derby

LONDON, July 27.-Sir Henry Mallaby-Deeley has bought Call Boy, winner of this year's Derby, for £60,000, (approximately \$291,000), executors of the estate of the late Frank Curzon announced tonight.

Mallaby-Deeley said he bought Call Boy to prevent its leaving the country. There had been reports that an American syndicate had offered \$250,000 for the horse.

Frank Curzon, popular theatrical man, collapsed after "leading in" Call Boy at the Derby and receiving King George's congratulations. He died after a brief illness.

Mallaby-Deeley, a former member of parliament, gained prominence a few years ago when he started a factory-to-wearer cut rate clothing store in the Strand. He claimed that there was profiteering in men's clothes. His store was stormed by eager purchasers, and many thousands of suits were sold. His name became a catch word and the nickname for suits in London was Mallaby-Deeley's for a year or two afterwards.

THE MARKETS (Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, Que., July 27.-The demand from the United Kingdom for Canadian grain was quiet here today and only sales of a few odd loads of low grade wheat were made. The trade in cash grain in the domestic market was also slow, the only business being a sale of an odd load of Manitoba 5 wheat at thirteen cents per bushel under the Winnipeg, October, option.

The trade in carlots of oats was fair and values were firm. The undertone to the market for spring wheat grades of flour was strong but there was no change in prices. The trade was dull. The movement of winter wheat flour was also of a limited character. A feature of the millfeed trade was the continued good enquiry from United States buyers for shorts and prices for straight carlots equivalent to \$37.50 per ton here were bid freely but on account of the somewhat limited supply available the value of business was checked. There was no change in local prices and the trade was fair. The demand for standard grades of rolled oats showed no improvement and prices were unchanged. The egg market was inactive but prices were well maintained for all grades. The receipts were 1,082 cases. The trade in buttes was again of a quiet nature but the undertone was steady. The receipts were 175 packages. The local and foreign demand for cheese was dull and the undertone was inclined to be easier. Western grades were noted at 19 1/2 to 19 3/4 cents per pound and eastern grades at 18 3/4 cents to 19 cents per pound.

EGGS

Ottawa-The general condition of the Canadian egg market is unchanged today.

Toronto-Dealers are quoting country shippers extras 33 to 35, firsts 30 to 31, seconds 26 to 30.

Montreal-This market is working higher, sales are being made in a jobbing way at extras 36, firsts 33, seconds 30. There is a good demand in evidence and a further advance is not improbable.

Edmonton-The egg market here is steady with dealers paying country shippers extras 28, firsts 25, seconds 20.

Calgary-There is no change in the tone or price of this egg market, with dealers quoting country shippers extras 28, firsts 25, seconds 20, Saint John-This market is quiet in a wholesale way with prices unchanged. Receipts are holding at about the same level as last week. Dealers are paying country shippers extras 33, firsts 30, seconds 25.
