### THAT CAR OF YOURS

It is not generally known that perhaps a clutch has more to do with the actual life of a car than any other unit.

A grabbing clutch affects every part of the car from the engine crank shaft to the differential and springs.

It is very easy to know a car that is blessed with a clutch that is operating properly. The running gear generally is in good shape and the car itself is a pleasure to drive.

Clutches will give trouble some time or another, but much of this trouble can be avoided by proper clutch adjustment and can be made to work as intended.

Check your clutch for adjustment and flexibility and prolong the life of your car.

Ques.—Can you tell me how to time a magneto that has been pulled apart. I pulled a—Magneto to pieces and cannot seem to get it fixed so that it will give any spark.

A.—The magneto of which you speak is of the high tension type and is timed in the following manner:—

The "shuttle" or armature core is first placed in a vertical position, then turned the way it rotates when working through the highest potential of E. M. F. which can be felt by the hand when turning it slowly.

The highest point of resistance is the spot in which the primary points should open on retard, and the distributor brush set to come in contact with any contact point on the distributor cover.

We feed a quantity of it to old foxes in winter and believe it is much better than feeding too much meat. We do not do any baking or boiling of foods, as we find your cod oil biscuit does away with the necessity and gives us better results. Imperial Fox Biscuit and milk is our principal food all summer for puppies. There is considerable danger in feeding meat to old foxes as they carry the puppie. As the biscuits contain ground meat, I think the puppie do very well on it alone with milk. They eat it slowly and chew it fine, which is an aid to digestion. Our puppies are usually well developed and in good condition, which speaks well for your biscuit. Wishing you continued success in this P. E. Island industry,
