Substantial Salad Cake

When a tempting salad is to furnish the main course of luncheon or a cold supper, it is rounded out by the service of something substantial but interesting in the way of a bread accompaniment. For the salad that is merely a refreshing interlude in a meal of several courses, the merest bite of some suitable accessory is in order. For the complete luncheon, from the standpoint of both enjoyment and health, serve a salad and a plateful of hot brown muffins. Either bran muffins made with bran and white or whole wheat flour or those made with brown flour alone, seem especially good. There is a nutty, rich flavor to these brown muffins that you will find perfection with a luncheon salad.

Cheese straws are very correct in the formal service of a salad. Make your rich, flaky paste; roll the pastry out in a thin sheet, spread half of it with grated, nippy, Canadian cheese, sprinkle with paprika, fold over the other half of the pastry sheet, roll out again, sprinkle with the cheese and paprika and after the third time you have done this, cut in long, narrow straws, quarter-inch wide and three inches in length. Bake in a quick oven until a golden brown.

Thin brown bread and butter sandwiches are good with your salad. So is steamed Boston brown bread or nut bread. An I hope you will every-one try this delicious brown scone that is so quickly and easily made; it is at its best on the second day:

- 4 cups flour
- 2 cups bran
- 1-2 teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 tablespoon boiling water
- Buttermilk or sour milk.

Sift the fine, dry ingredients together, mix with the bran and add sufficient sour milk or buttermilk to make a stiff batter. Turn into a narrow loaf pan or spread out in a heavy iron frying pan and bake in a moderate oven. If you like a soft crust, brush it with milk when taken from the oven.

PRESIDENT FILLMORE'S BIRTHPLACE LOCATED

AUBURN, N. Y., May 8.—(U.P.)—The Ouyaga County Historical Society recently announced it had located the birthplace of Millard Fillmore, thirteenth president of the United States.

The site of the birthplace, in the town of Summerhill, not far from Fillmore Glen, has been recognized by Marquis de Lafayette French, 83, of Antwerp, N. Y., the announcement said.

French, according to the society, said the cabin in which Fillmore was born was razed for firewood when he was a boy. French recognized the locality by trees and the geology of the land, the society claimed.

French said he played in that neighborhood in his youth.

EGG ON TOAST ET MUSHROOM

Delicacies Which Are Nice To Eat, Easy To Cook And At Present Cheap.

Put six fresh eggs carefully into boiling water, leave four and one-half minutes, place in cold water and remove shells with care. Toast slices of bread after removing the crusts, place a slice of cooked chicken or boiled ham on the toast, set the eggs on the meat, pour hot mushroom sauce over all and put a small sauted mushroom cap on top of each egg. Garnish with finely chopped parsley and serve as soon as possible.

- Brown Mushroom Sauce.
- 1-2 pound mushrooms
- 1-3 cup butter
- 4 tablespoons flour
- 1 cup boiling water
- 1 teaspoon vegetable or meat extract.
- Salt
- Pepper

Remove stems from mushrooms and scrape them; add skins from mushroom caps, cover with boiling water in which extract has been dissolved; cook slowly until liquid is reduced to one-half cup. Reserve one mushroom cap for each egg and cut remainder in slices. Saute mushrooms in frying pan in three tablespoons butter for three minutes. Remove mushrooms and to fat in pan add two tablespoons butter and stir until flour is brown. Then add soup stock and mushroom liquor and stir until boiling point is reached. Add the mushrooms, salt and pepper, and keep hot until serving time.

Gardening

THE GLADIOLUS

(Experimental Farms Note)
The gladiolus is one of the most popular flowers, and rightly so. It is of easy culture and can be obtained in a great range of colours, with flowers of various shapes and sizes. Some of the flowers are very brilliant in colour and some are of soft and subdued hues, suiting all tastes. The effect of a number of these flowers in bloom on a single stem at one time is very striking.

Any good garden soil is suitable. The corns or bulbs may be planted as soon as the frost is out of the ground in the spring but where the season is long a time is chosen that will bring them deep in groups, with the corns about four inches apart or in rows two to three feet apart. Do not use diseased corns. They should be kept in sunlight and the soil should be kept well cultivated to keep down the weeds.

For cut flowers the stems may be cut when the first bud opens, leaving two sets of leaves to help build up the new corns. The corns are dug before there is danger of their being frozen and left to dry in the cellar and kept dry all winter.

A few of the best ones are the following: Albartros, Joerg's White, Mrs. Dr. Norton, Apple Blossoms, Golden Dream, Golden Measure, Dr. F. E. Bennett, Sultan, Purple Glory, April-cup Glow, Giant Nymph, Pfitzer's Triumph, W. H. Phillips, Evelyn Kirtland, Charles Dickens, Velchenblau, Ann Eberitus—W. T. Macoun Dominion Horticulturist.

SOUTHERN SPON BREAD

This dish which like our Johnny Cake comes to us from our American neighbors (who appreciate to the full the goodness of a nutty, golden cornmeal and the tempting things it will make) is often the note of interest for any one meal in the day—breakfast luncheon or informal supper.

- 1 cup cornmeal,
- 2 cups water,
- 1 cup milk,
- 1 teaspoon salt,
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 2 eggs.

Add the water to the cornmeal and bring slowly to boiling point. Cook five minutes. Remove from the fire and add the milk, salt, butter and well-beaten eggs. Beat for two minutes, then turn into a well-greased pan and bake in a moderate oven, 350 degrees F., for about 25 minutes. Serve from the dish, piping hot, with a spoon.
