MADRID, Sept. 26.—(Special).—A mutiny has broken out in the ranks of a battalion of the Royal Spanish army at a moment when the troops were leaving Algiers for the scene of fighting in Morocco.

BRITAIN TO MAKE BIG NAVAL DISPLAY

LONDON, Sept. 26.—(Special).—The announcement by the Admiralty that a fleet comprising eight battle ships, three battle cruisers, eight cruisers and eight light cruisers will be sent to the Mediterranean early in November, coupled with the despatch of four large armoured vessels, which will have their base in the future at Bermuda, indicates a radical change in the British naval policy, which, on account of friction with Germany, has kept practically all the fighting units within home waters for several years.

MEXICANS ROB INDISCRIMINATELY MEXICO CITY, Sept. 26.—(Special).—Twenty-five American refugees from Durango have arrived here, having travelled overland to Zacatecas. The rest of the other foreigners also have left Durango, according to the refugees, who say the rebels rob Mexicans and foreigners indiscriminately.
