There passed away on May 12th, at the residence of her youngest son, D.B. Huntley, City, an aged and respected Christian lady, Mrs. Henry Huntley, Sen. The eldest daughter of Thomas Kiley, the deceased was born at Belfast, P. E. I., on the third of April 1825. She was the first child baptized in this Island by Rev. John MacLennan, by whom also she was married in 1843. From that time she lived at Vernon River Bridge until a year and a half ago when she moved to Charlottetown with her son Benjamin. Of her family of nine children all except two sons, John and Charles, are living, namely—Henry and Benjamin in Charlottetown, William and Watson at Vernon River Bridge, Albert at O'Leary, Mrs. Vanderstine of Hermitage, and Mrs. Angus McEugall in Newton, Belfast, Mrs. Huntley leaves forty grandchildren and four great-grandchildren. About the time of her marriage she gave her will and life into the guiding influence of her Heavenly Father, accepted Jesus Christ as her personal Saviour, and became a member of the first Bible Christian Church organized in this province under the leadership of that well known and faithful servant of the Lord, the late Rev. Francis Methersal. She remained a consistent member of this church until the union of the branches of the Methodist Church when she transferred her membership to the newly consolidated Church. As Mrs. Huntley lived within speaking distance of the parsonage at Vernon River, from the beginning of Methodist church life there under Rev. Francis Methersal until but a few months ago, she had a personal acquaintance with every minister who has been on that circuit, all of whom could testify to her many acts of kindness and to her labors and endeavours to benefit and assist others. She spent her life working for those with whom she came into contact, and, trusting in a living Christ she has gone to her reward. It may be said of her, in the words of the great Apostle Paul, "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith; henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness which the Lord, the righteous Judge shall give to me at that day." Rev. H. E. Thomas of the First Methodist Church, Charlottetown, conducted the funeral service at the home of the deceased. Thence the body was conveyed by train to Vernon River where many friends had assembled to pay a last tribute of respect. Here, in the cemetery of her old home, the mortal remains of this good woman were tenderly committed to the earth Rev. C. K. Hudson of Vernon River officiating. Com.
