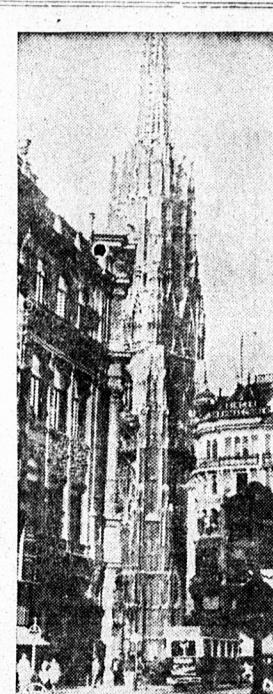
Outlines New Scheme To Protect Industrial Plants.
