THE DIAZ GOVERNMENT TOTTERING

Demands from Berlin and Madrid on Diaz and the Rebels Growing Strong CRISIS IS GRAVE

MEXICO CITY, May 4—With pre-emptory demands from Berlin and Madrid for immediate protection to German and Spanish citizens, threatened by the rebels and bandits with four columns of insurgents, aggregating five thousand well-equipped troops, reported to be marching on the capital, and the central Government tottering in its weakness, the belief here today is that Diaz must make an early choice between asking President Taft to restore order in Mexico with U. S. troops or turning over the Government to the rebels.
