CHEESE BOXES TO BE STRONGER

Strong Appeal by the Chief of Dairy Department

Cheese has Increased in Weight and at the Same Time the Strength of the Box has Been Reduced.

Ottawa, March 6.—At the dairy convention recently held Mr. J. A. Ruddick, Chief of the Dairy Division, Ottawa, made a strong appeal for better cheese boxes. Boxes are, said he, necessary to protect the cheese from injury in transportation, to facilitate their handling, and to permit their being piled several tiers deep in a warehouse without being crushed out of shape. Without the boxes the cheese could not be delivered in Great Britain in a presentable condition. Now, if it is desirable to have cheese boxes at all, it is surely important that the box should be strong enough to reach its destination in a sound condition. A great many shipments of cheese are landed on the other side with twenty-five per cent of the boxes broken. Indeed some reports from the inspectors show a larger percentage. This simply means that one-quarter of the money paid for the boxes has been spent to no purpose. And that is not all, for the broken boxes, in a shipment, while detracting from the actual value of the cheese which they once contained, make the whole not less attractive to a purchaser.

What are the reasons for this unsatisfactory state of affairs? In the first place we have increased the weight of our cheese, and at the same time reduced the strength of the box by using thinner veneer and an inferior quality of elm. It is evident also that there are many box makers who have never properly learned their trade, as a large proportion of the boxes is only half put together.

The increasing cost and scarcity of elm, and the demand of cheese manufacturers for a cheap box, have induced the veneer-cutters to reduce the thickness of the veneer, until much of that now offered for sale is entirely too flimsy for the purpose. It should never be cut less than full size to the inch. A great deal of it is six and some even seven to the inch.

Another fault in the veneer is that the logs are not boiled sufficiently to soften the wood; consequently the veneer knife shatters it while cutting, and gives it a tendency to split easily. Another result of insufficient boiling or steaming is that the salts of the wood are not extracted; consequently boxes made from such stock mould very readily.

When I began buying boxes for the cool curing rooms, said Mr. Ruddick, I insisted on getting heavy selected veneers. The box-makers tried to persuade me to accept the thin veneer, some claiming that it would stand more rough usage than the thicker material. I have had to give two cents above the regular price for such boxes, but I paid to do so, for the reports on shipments from the curing rooms showed only one and two per cent broken. Of course these shipments were all carefully loaded into the cars and not left standing four or five tiers high to be thrown down and smashed by the first shunt. Hundred of boxes are broken in that way. I believe there is almost enough wasted in trimming boxes, either in the cheese factory, or at the warehouse to make up this difference of two cents. Boxes are now worth at least one cent per inch in depth and that part which is cut away is absolute waste.

If boxes are not thoroughly dry when put on the cheese, the growth of mould is started. This is particularly the case in cold weather when the boxes dry slowly.

In aiming to have the cheese fit the boxes without trimming, it is well to remember that a box, which measures twelve inches deep when newly made, will shrink to eleven and a half inches as it dries out. The same box will expand again to nearly its original depth after it has been in a warehouse for a week or so, because it absorbs moisture from the cheese. In fitting dry boxes to the cheese, it is necessary, therefore, to have the cheese project at least one-quarter of an inch above the edge of the box. One would think it hardly necessary to call attention to the importance of having the box of the proper diameter to fit the cheese snugly. No box will stand the handling that is not supported by the cheese on the inside.

LOST BOTH FEET BY FREEZING

P. E. I., Man Has a Thrilling Experience

In the West—He Was Unable to Find His Way While Travelling Across the Prairie—Interesting Interview.

Returning home from the west, having had both feet frozen off on the prairie, William J. Murphy, of Prince Edward Island, arrived in Moncton yesterday afternoon. He went west on a harvest excursion last fall, and during a large part of the time since, following the amputation of his feet, he lay in a hospital in Manitoba.

A reporter talked with Mr. Murphy last evening, as he sat in an invalid's chair, in the smoking room at the railway station. The unfortunate man attracted the attention of many people about the room, who kindly attended to his wants as an expression of their sympathy. He had several hours to wait in Moncton after his arrival on No. 28, yesterday, before proceeding to Pictou, on the early morning train. He was travelling alone.

Mr. Murphy is a comparatively young man of rather cultured expression, and talked freely of his experiences on the prairie. He had been working in Sydney, C. B. previous to his departure for the west fields. Going out on one of the harvest excursions, he reached Winnipeg, and from there went to Oak Lake, about thirty-five miles west of Brandon. He went to work in the wheat fields and spent the fall.

He had no ill luck during the first part of his stay in the west, and was well satisfied with the country.

One night in November during a cold snap, Mr. Murphy started from Oak Lake to walk to a point some distance away. The thermometer was a considerably below zero, but the intensity of the cold did not make itself apparent to Mr. Murphy as he trudged on, endeavoring to reach his destination. Some snow was on the ground. He managed to keep warm, however, as he walked on and on thinking he would soon reach the damp breezes, he did not realize how cold it was, for the atmosphere on the prairie is dryer than in the eastern provinces, the real temperature is not so apparent.

Failing to reach any habitation or even to ascertain how far he had yet to travel, Mr. Murphy discovered that he had lost his way. He was in a partial wilderness or strip of land covered with shrub-wood. Realizing that it was useless to endeavor to proceed further, he resolved to spend the night as best he could alone, and to seek shelter. Nearby he managed to collect some wood thinking he could build a fire.

He succeeded in lighting some inflammable material by which he warmed his hands and face. On his feet were a pair of long boots. These were tight and prevented the proper circulation of the blood. Besides snow had melted in them. Along towards morning the fire was not sufficient to protect him from the cold, and his feet became badly frozen and says that when morning came he succeeded in making his return to Oak Lake. When taken to the hospital the doctors gave him little encouragement. In a day or two mortification set in and both feet were amputated, just above the ankles.

Mr. Murphy was obliged to stop over at Moncton last night as his ticket read via Point du Chene. It was necessary to make a change for Pictou next morning. He belongs to Belfast near Charlottetown. Some kind hearted persons, including officials about the railway station here contributed towards paying part of the unfortunate man's travelling expenses. —Moncton Transcript.
