THE CATTLE EMBARGO.

Notwithstanding our preferential tariff in favor of British goods the Mother Country most unreasonably persists in maintaining the so-called embargo on Canadian cattle, requiring all cattle imported from this country to be slaughtered immediately on being landed. The embargo dates from November 1892, when the Minister for Agriculture in Mr. Gladstone's Government had the restriction imposed. The real object was to make a concession in the way of protection to British farmers and stock-raisers against Canadian competition. The pretext put forward was to safeguard British herds from the infection of pleuro-pneumonia. Since that date 800,000 Canadian cattle have been landed and slaughtered without the discovery of a single case of pleuro-pneumonia among them.

This unreasonable restriction becomes the more so in the case of a nation committed to free trade principles and when applied to a Colony which has made such noteworthy concessions as Canada has made in favor of the admission of British merchandise. It imposes a very serious loss upon our stock-raisers and shippers. Cattle just landed after a rough passage are often in ill condition to be slaughtered for market. Besides, the restriction has wholly destroyed the once large trade in cattle sent from Canada to Britain to be either finished or wholly fattened on the other side of the water.

Successive Canadian Governments have remonstrated in vain against the cattle embargo. At the last session of the Imperial Parliament Mr. Hanbury, President of the British Board of Agriculture, admitted that the pretext of disease could hardly be maintained against Canadian cattle, but the cattle-breeding farmers have so far had influence enough to prevent its removal. Hon. Sydney Fisher and Prof. Robertson during their recent visit, renewed the effort to obtain simple justice in this matter, and they met with some support from the farmers of Scotland who had in former years found it profitable to import Canadian "stockers" and finish them on the Scottish pastures. But they were met with a point-blank refusal from Mr. Hanbury. He offered no better excuse than that though Canada is now and has for years been free from cattle disease, it might break out any day!

On this flimsy and miserable pretext utterly dishonest as it is, "free trade Britain" continues a policy of protection for British cattle-breeders. It is apparent that the thin end of the protection wedge had already been introduced in the Mother Country. At the same time there seems to be very little disposition to give to the Dominion of Canada the slightest modicum of preference in return for the preferential tariff we have adopted. If these conditions are continued in the future, as they seem likely to be, a movement may spring up here to reconsider our tariff relations with the Parent State.
