Rev. J. B. Champion Died in Philadelphia

Word has been received in Fredericton, N. B., of the death of Rev. John B. Champion, M.A., B.D., Th.D., which occurred on January 18th, in Philadelphia.

Dr. Champion was born in Alberton, P. E. I., June 18th, 1869, son of the late James and Margaret Brooks Champion. He received his teacher's certificate from Prince of Wales College in Charlottetown. After teaching three years on Prince Edward Island he entered Acadia University for his theological course, he held pastorates in Arcadia and Chebogue in Nova Scotia, Sussex, N. B., and later Union St. Baptist Church (formerly Devon) in this city. While here he was largely instrumental in the erection of the present parsonage, doing much of the work himself. He received his B. A. degree from the University of New Brunswick with honors in Philosophy and Economics, while still carrying on his Church work. After graduation from U. N. B. he began studies at Colgate Seminary, where after three years' study he was awarded his B. D. degree—at the same time being pastor of a church. Acadia University awarded him the M. A. degree ad eundem, his majors being philosophy and sociology. In 1925 when the Eastern Baptist Theological Seminary in Philadelphia opened its doors, he became a trustee of the institution. In 1928 this Seminary conferred upon him the Degree of Doctor of Theology. In the same year he resigned as a trustee and was appointed to the Chair of Christian Doctrine in said school, which position he occupied until his retirement. After his graduation from Colgate Seminary, Dr. Champion's pastorates included Baptist Churches in Geneva, N. Y.; Branford, Ont.; McMinnville, Oregon; White Plains, N. Y.; and in Philadelphia, Pa.

Dr. Champion was an author of note, having written nine books. His last was "The Heart of the New Testament" was published in 1941.

He was twice married, his first wife being Miss Emma Dunbar of Alma, P. E. I. By this marriage there were three sons (all physicians) and four daughters. He is survived by his second wife who was Miss Edith Webster, a returned missionary, and two sons, Benjamin and David. Also surviving are a brother, Rev. Josiah Brooks Champion of Windsor, Ont., and a sister, Mrs. Ella Holland of Lower Sackville, N. S. The late James B. Champion, M.D., of O'Leary, P. E. I., was a brother. Mrs. Howard Robinson, Union Street, is a cousin.
