The Stanley is fast in the ice off Low Point (C. B.) When she gets clear she will go to the Straits of Canso to help clear the ice from the shipping pier of the Inverness Railway & Coal Company and will afterwards attempt to reach Flint Island and find out the cause of the distress signals which have been flying for several days. The officers of the Montmagny say the people could easily walk to the mainland over the ice if they were urgently in need of provisions or medical assistance.

## CALLS RACE SUICIDE FAULT OF FAIR SEX.

VIENNA, Feb. 14—Professor Wilhelm Ostwald of Leipzig winner in 1908 of the Nobel prize for chemical achievement discusses in the Neue Freie Presse of this city the question "Is Europe Decadent?" and is incidentally declares that woman is responsible for the initiative of race extinction.

The professor asserts that decadence theories are mainly spread by young people who are disillusioned by idle life in great cities, and who imagine they are products of a general decadence.

"But nature," says Ostwald, "has provided against the spreading of this exceptional type of individuals. They show a strong disinclination to reproduction, and so the competing biological conclusion may be drawn that by the natural order of things their race is doomed to die out. Therefore there is no likelihood, and there should be no fear, that their race will establish itself and multiply."

"Decadents must be regarded as disappearing individual phenomena of our complicated social life," he says. "They are not a sign of genuine general decay, but merely an inevitable by-product of intensified development. There is still another type of decadent—the aesthetic individual."

## DEBATE IN HOUSE OF COMMONS.

OTTAWA, Feb. 17—The debate on the Reciprocity Agreement, which promises to last for the next fortnight was continued in the House of Commons yesterday by Houghton, Lennox, and J. E. Armstrong on the Opposition side, and by A. B. Warburton of P. E. Island, on the Liberal side.

Mr. Warburton characterized as insulting and absurd suggestion that the Prime Ministers of Great Britain and Canada had entered into a foul conspiracy to detach Canada from the British Crown.

Countering the Conservative argument of disloyalty he declared that he would urge the Government to buy Conservative ultra loyalists to the test by increasing the British Preference to 50 per cent.

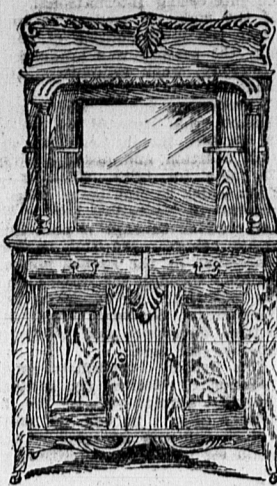

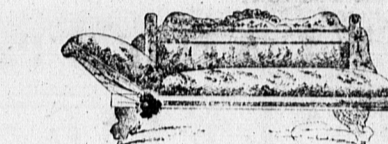
