FOOTBALL.

Three teams representative of different sections of the city are showing football ability worthy of special mention, and considering the fact when banded together into an all-star aggregation these huskies should make 'em all step when the time comes—and that won't be very long.

Excuse please—but I may say again that more snap should be put into the passing; this running across the field with the ball until tackled doesn't get you anywhere—move ahead and pass with a snap and pass often. Remember fellow Mount A. is coming over and perhaps the Dalhousie Tigers; the material is here and it is hoped that no repetition will take place. If we cannot win, we can at least put up a real good showing.

WORTHY CAUSE.

Plan Celebration Of Armistice Day

MARITIME OVERSEAS OFFICERS TO HOLD REUNION DINNER; 400 TO 500 EXPECTED

Among the outstanding events which are being planned for Armistice Day celebration this year will be a reunion dinner of all the officers of the Maritime Provinces who served overseas during the war, as well as other ranks who saw active service and are now commissioned in the Canadian militia. Preliminary arrangements were made last evening at a meeting held in the office of Norman P. MacLeod, in the post office building.

The event will take place on the evening of Armistice Day in the Admiral Beatty Hotel and a committee now has the arrangements well under way. It is anticipated that between 400 and 500 officers from all parts of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island will be in attendance. It is the aim of the committee to have as guests of honor prominent Canadians who held high rank in the Canadian corps during the European war, and already some invitations have been sent out, but no announcements will be made until acceptances have been received.

COMMITTEES.

The committee having the arrangements in hand consists of: John Gale, general chairman; Norman P. MacLeod, vice-chairman; E. C. Armstrong, secretary. Sub-committees appointed include: Catering, Mr. MacLeod, chairman; E. J. Cronin and A. G. Rainnie; publicity, F. J. Nisbet, chairman; P. S. Jennings, W. J. Ryan and Atwood Bridges; tickets, G. G. Anglin.

In order to ensure a representative attendance from all parts of the three provinces and from all branches of the service, arrangements are being made to have committee men appointed in all the principal centres in the Maritimes. Mr. Rowland Paton of Charlottetown is named for P. E. I. According to the present plans, the proposed celebration promises to be one of the largest events of its kind held in the lower provinces since the close of the war.
