P. W. C. Defeats Saints 8-0 To Retain Island Intermediate Title

Prince of Wales College Saturday retained the provincial intermediate intercollegiate football title, defeating St. Dunstan's University 8-0 to win the best of three game series two games to one.

All the scoring was in the first half in one of the most bitter fought games in the history of the series. First fights flared several times during the hectic battle.

Prince of Wales, holding the title now for the fifth year, had the better of territory in the first half but the Saints rallied strongly in the second and play was evenly divided.

Less than ten minutes after the game started Nicolle raced 36 yards to score, taking the oval from Proud and Brehaut after it came from a scrum. Quigley was successful in collecting the extra points. Robertson scored the second try. He was following up a kick very closely and when the S.D.U. full-back tumbled he grabbed the ball to go over the line in the corner of the field. Quigley's kick was a little low for the additional points.

With victory slipping away, the Saints rallied strongly and in the second half kept the wearers of the red and blue busy turning back one scoring attempt after another. The greatest Saint threat came when their three-quarter man McDonald attempted a field goal from 26 yards out. The ball sailed over the bar but the goal was disallowed since the ball struck a player before going over.

Detroit Wins 4-1 From Montreal To Deadlock Clubs With 8 Points Each

DETROIT, Nov. 11 (CP) — Scoring twice in both the biggest and third periods for their biggest goal production off netminder Bill Durman in his two-year National Hockey League career, Detroit Red Wings defeated Montreal 4-1 tonight before the year's top crowd here—14,234 fans.

The Red Wings actually scored only three of the four goals off Durman themselves, for Maurice (Rocket) Richard got in the way of one of Mutt Bruneteau's 4-1 tonight before the year's top crowd here—14,234 fans.

The defeat was Montreal's second straight here. In their last appearance in Olympia last season, the Canadiens lost 2-1 to Detroit. Tonight's visit here was Montreal's first this year though the Canadiens had beaten Detroit 3-1 at Montreal.

Detroit climbed even with Montreal by winning tonight to deadlock the clubs at eight points each.

Chicago, Toronto Divide N. H. L. Week-End Games

In their playoff series for the Nova Scotia crown, the Tech engineers blanked St. Mary's College 19-0 and Acadia Axemen 8-0. U.N.B. clinched the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island title with victories of 11-5 over Mount Allison University and 9-8 over St. Dunstan's University.
